SENATE.

Feb. 10-Mr Van Buren presented the memorial of several thousand persons, residents in New York. praying an alteration in the alien aws. Referred to the committee on he judiciary.

Mr Lloyd, of Maryland, presented the memorial of the board of trusees of Columbia College, in the Disrict of Columbia, praying a loan from government, for certain purpose-referred to the committee on he District of Columbia.

The bill authorizing the building of an additional number oi' sloops of war, was read the third tinie and pussed.

The senate, as in committee of the whole, Mr Ruggles in the chair, proceeded to considder the bill better o secure the accountability of public officers anti others; which was intro luced under leave obtained by Mr Holmes, of Maine, and reported by the committee on finance. The bill was passed to be engrossed and read the third time.

Feb. 11.-The bill better to secure he accountability of public officers and others, was read a third time, bassed, and sent to the other House.

The bill froin the other House, au horizing surveys for roads and cahals, was real and passed to a second reading.

As the public were notified of the day on which he would be killed, a consid. erable assemblage of people, were col. lected from all the contiguous parts, to see him weighed.
