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LAWS OF THE UNION. [BY AUTHORITY].

AN ACT in addition to the several acts for the establishment and regulation of the Treasury, War and Navy Department.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That is shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury, to cause to he carried to the account of the surplus fund. any moneys, appropriated for the Department of War, or of the Wavy, which mag remain unexpended in the Treasury, or in tile hands of the Treasurer, as agent for those depart ments, whenever he shall be informed, by the Secretaries of those Departments, that the object for which the appropriation was made has been offected. And it shall be the duty of the Secretaries of War and Navy Departments, to cause any baiance of moneys drawn out of the Treasury. which shall remain unexpended. after the object for which the appropriation was made shall be effected, to be repaid to the Treasury of the United States; and such moneys. when so repaid, shall be carried to the surplus fund.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Secretaries of the War and Navy Departments to lay before Congress, on the first day of Feb ruary, of each year, a statement of the appropriations of the preceding year, for their departments, respectively, showing the amount appropriated under each, and the balance remaining unexpended, either in the Treasury, or in the Treasurer? hands, as agent of the War and Navy Departments, on the thirty first Decembei preceding: And, it shall be further the duty of the Secretaries aforesaid, to esti mate the probable demands which may re main on each appropriation, find the balance shall be deducted from the estimates of the departments respectively, for the service of the current year; and accounts shall also be annually rendered, in manner and form as aforesaid, exhibiting the sums expended out of the estimates aforesaid, and the balance, if **any**, which may remain on hand, together with such information, connected with the same. as shall be deemed proper. And whenever any moneys, appropriated to the Department of War, nr of the Navy, shall remain un-expended, in the hands of the Treasurer, as agent of either of those departments, for more than two years after: the expiration of the calendar year in which the act ofappropriation shall have been passed, or to which it refers, it shall be the duty of the Secretary of such department to inform the Secretary of the Treasury of the fact, antl the Secretary of the Treasury carried to the account of the surplus fund: Provided, that, when an act making an appropriation, shall assign a longer duration for the coiapletion of its object, no transfer of any unespended balance, to the account of the surplus fund, shall be made until the expiration of the time fixed

in such act. Sec. 3. And be itfurther enucfed, That, in the settlement of the accounts of the War Department, for services or supplies accruing prior to the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, the expenditures shall be charged to arrearages, and the balances of public money hereafter recovered out of advances made in the War Department, for services or supplies, prior to the date aforesaid, shall be returned to the Treasury, and, by the Secretary of the Treasury, be carried to the surplus fund.

That the above mentioned act, of the third of March, one thousand eight hundred and rline, shall be, and the same is hereby, so mended, that the President shall be auhorised to direct a portion of the moneys ippropriated for any one of the following branches of expenditure in the military lepartment, viz: For the subsistence of he army, for forage, for the medical and iospital department, for the quartermaser's department, to be applied to any other of the above mentioned branches of expenditure in the same department; antl hat the President shall he also further auhorised, to direct a portion of the moneys ippropriated for any of the following partment, viz: For provisions, for medi ine and hospital stores, for repairs of vesmels, for clothing, to be applied to any other of the ahove mentioned branches of expenditure in the same department; and hat no transfers of appropriation, from or o other branches of expenditure, shall be rereafter made

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That io contract shall hereafter he made by the Secretary of State, or of the Department if War, or of the Navy, escept under a aw authorising the same, or under an appropriation adequate to its fulfilment; and excepting, also, contracts for the subsis-tence and clothing of the army or navy, and contracts by the Quartermaster Department, which may be made by the Secretaries of those departments.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That no land shall be purchased on account of the United States, except under a law au

thorising such purchase.
Sec. S. And be it further enneted, Tha it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Treasury to annex to the annual estimates of the appropriations required for the public service, a statement of the appropriations for the service of the year which ma: have been made by former acts, and, also a statement of the sums remaining in the **T** reasury, or in the hands of the Treasurer, as agent of the War and Navy Departments, from the appropriations of for mer years estimating the amount of those sums which will not be required to defray expenses incurred in a previous year, and showing the whole amount which will be subject to the disposition of the executive government in the year to which the estimates apply

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That the second section of the act, entitled "An act making appropriation for the payment of the arrearages which have been incurred for the support of the Military Establishment previous to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventeen," passed on the sixteenth day of Fehruary, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, be, and is hereby repealed .: '

And be itfurther enacted, That there shall he a register and receiver appointed to each of the aforesaid land offices, to superintend the sales of the public lands in their respective districts, who shall reside at the places designated in their respective districts, at which the offices are fixed give security in the same manner, in the same sums, and whose compensation, emoluments, and duties, and authority, shall, in every respect, he the same, in relation to the lands which shall be disposed of at their offices, as are or may be by law provided in relation to thre registers and receivers of public moneys in the several offices established for the selection the public lands.

Sec. J. And be it further enacted, That the provisions of the second, third, and fifth, section of the act entitled "An act to designate the boundaries of districts, and establish land offices, for the disposal of the public lands, not heretofore offered for sale: in the states of Ohio and Indiana," approved March the third, eighteen hundred and nineteen, be, and the same are hereby, made applicable to the aforesaid districts and offices, so far as they are not changed by subsequent laws of the United States.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives & the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the powers of the commissioners for ascertaining and deciding on the rights of persons claiming lands in the district of Detroit, as defined by the second section of an act, entitled "An act to authorise the granting of patents for land according to the surveys that have been made, and to grant donation right to certain claimants of land in the district of Detroit, and for on the third of April one thousand eight hundred and twelve, shall hc, and are herehy, revived. And the said commissioners shall perform tlie duties therein prescribed, in relation to the claims which have been filed with the register of the land office for the said district, in pursuance of the act, entitled "An act allowing further time for entering donation rights to lands in the district of Detroit." And the said commissioners shall have power to examine and decide, according to the laws re-sepecting the same, the claims which have heen filed with the register of the land office, and not heretofore decided on; and they shall transmit their report, and transcripts of their decisions, to the Secretary of the Treasury, to be laid before Congress, in the manner directed by former laws providing for the adjustment of such

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the said commissioners shall be, and tliey are hereby, authorised to employ, with the approbation of the Secretary of the Trea-

pose of ascertaining the titles and claims o land at the settlements of Green Bay and Prairie des Chiens. Et shall be the luty of the said agent to give public noice, at each of the said settlements, of the time and place therein, at which he shall. attend for the purpose of receiving notices and evidences of titles and claims to larids within the same. And every person having title or claims to lands within the settlements aforesaid, shall produce the evidence of his title or claim to the said agent, who shall record the same books to be kept for that purpose. And, after the said agent shall have remained at the places aforesaid, a time sufficient for the inhabitants to produce tlie evidence of their claims, he shall make his report thereof to the said commissioners, who shall have power to examine and decide on the claims so reported to them, according to the laws for adjusting and settling the claims to land in the district of Detroit, except that which relates to donations of vacant land adjacent to the land confirmed, shall not be considered applicable to claim in the settlements aforesaid. And the said commissioners shall transmit their report, and transcripts of their decisions, to the Secretary of the Treasury, on or before the first of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty one, to be laid before Congress at their next session [hereafter, in the same manner as was directed by law in respect to the claims to lands in the district of

Detroit. Sec. 3. And be it further enacted. That the agent aforesaid shall taae an oath for the taithful discharge of the duties enjoine 100 him, and he shall conform, in discharging the said duties, to such general instructions as shall be given him by the Secretnry of he Treasury; and the said commissioners and agent shall each receive five hundred dollars, as full compensation for the services to be performed under this act, together with the recording fees to the agent, and allowance to theregister, for a certificate of confirmation for donation rights provided for by former.

" passed on the eighteenth day of March, one the pension which became due on the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty, continue to receive the pension granted by the said act, until he shall have exhibited to some court of record, in the county, city or borough, in which he resides, a schedule, subscribed by him, containing his whole estate and income (his necessary clothing anrl bedding excepted,) and sliall have (hefore the said court, or some one of the judges thereof) taken arid subscribed, and produced to the said court, the following oath or affirmation, to wit. I, A. B. do solemnly swear or affirm (as the case may be) that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the eighteenth day of March, m e thousand eight hundred and eighteen, and that I have not, since that time, by gift, sale, or in any manner whatever, die . posed of **my** property, or any part thereof, with intent therebg'm-to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war," passed on the eight hundred and eighteen, and that I have not, nor has any person in trust for me, any prnpertp, or securities, contracts, or debts, due io me; nor have I any income, other than what is contained in the subscribed: Nor until such person shall have delivered, or cause to he delivered, to the Secretary of war, a copy of the aforesaid schedule antl oath or affirmation certified by the clerk of the court to which the said schedule was delivered, together with the opinion of the said court, also certified by their clerk, of the value of the property contained in the schedule: Provided, That, in every case in which the pensioner map be insane, or incapable of taking an oarh, the court may receive the said schedule, without the aforesaid oath or affirmation, from the committee or other person authorized to fake care of such per-
