TBY AUTHORITY.

AN ACT to defray the expenses of the militia when marching to places of rendezvous.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the expenses incurred, or to be incurred by marching the militia of any state or territery of the United States to their places of rendezvous, in pursuance of requisition of the President of the United States, or which shall have been, or may be incur-red in cases of calls made by the authority of any state or territory which shall have been or may be, approved by him, shall be adjusted, and paid in like manner as the expences incurred after their arrival at such place of rendezvous, on the requisition of the President of the United States: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be considered as authorising any speties of expenditure, previous to arriving at the place of rendezvous, which is not protided by existing laws to be paid for after their arrival at such place of rendezvous.

AN ACT for the relief of Richard M. Johnson. Johnson, for moneys disbursed in supplying a corps of mounted volunteers with ra-tions and forage, in the year one thereast eighthundred and thirteen, and to allow him eny sum not exceeding one thousand and eight dollars, and thirty seven cents, which allowance shall be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise ap-

Sec. 2. AN ACT authorising the disposal of certain lots of public ground in the city of New-Orleans and town of Mobile.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President of the United States shall have power, and he is hereby authorized, whenever in his opinion it shall be consistent with the public interest, to abandon the use of the navy arsenal, military hospital, and barracks, in the city of New Orleans aud Fort Charlotte, at the town of Mobile to cause the lots of ground whereon the said arsenal, hospital and barracks in New Orleans, and Fort Charlotte, at Mobile, now is, and to be surveyed and laid off in to lots, with suitable streets and avenues conforming, as near as may be, to the original plan of the city and town aforesaid, and, when the surreys are completed, 'one plat thereof shall be returned to 'the Secretary of the Treasury, and another to such officer or agent as the Presidentaha!! hiave authorized to dispose of the said lots; and the said lots of ground shall be offere ed at public sale at the city of New Or-leans and town of Mobile, respectively, on such day or days as the President shall, by his proclamation, designate for that .pur pose, in the same manner, and on the same conditions and terms of credit, as is provided by law for the sale of public lands of the United States.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the President of the United States, is hereby authorized, as soon as in his opinion the public interest will permit, to cause the Fort St. Charles to be demolished the second the navy yard in said city to be discontinued, and the lot of ground on which the said fort is erected, shall be appropriated to the use of a public square, and may be improved for that purpose by order of the corporation of the said city.

Sec. 2. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That subscription be opened in the city of Washington, under the direction of John have full power and authority to make in-Davidson. Satteries Clark, Alexander surances against fire, on any and every Kerr, R. C. Weightman, Benjamin G. Orr, William Brent, Samuel Miller, and William Doughty, or a majority of them, for raising a capital stock of two hundred and flyty dollars in shares of twenty five dollars each; and that each person, upon subscribing, pay to the persons above mentioned, five dollars, upon each share so subscribed for; and that the remainder of the said twenty-five dollars shall be secured by negotiable notes signed and endors ed to the satisfaction of the aforesaid John Davidson, Satterlee Clark, Alexander Kerr, R. C. Weightman, B. G. Orr, Wil-liam Brent, Samuel Miller, and William Doughty, or a majority of them, and payment thereof may be thereafter demanded. at such times, and in such proportions, as the president and directors, hereafter mentioned, shall judge adviseable, giving six weeks notice, in at least three of the gazettes printed in the District of Colum-

bia.
Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That every subscriber shall be entitled to vote by himself, his agent, or proxy, appointed under his hand and seal, attested by two witnesses, at all elections made by virtue of this act; and shall have as many votes as he holds shares, as far as ten shares; one vote for every five shares; which he may hold over ten shares, as far as fifty other shares; and one vote for every thir ty shares, which he may hold over sixty shares; and every stockholder, (not in debt to the company) may, with the assent of the president and directors in person, or by power of attorney, assign and transfer his stock in the company, in the books of the same, or any part thereof, not being less than a whole share; but no stockholder, indebted to the company office, and commissioner of claims to land, receive a dividend, until such debt is paid in the district of Kaskaskia. or secured, to the satisfaction of the presi-

dent and directors.. Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That is soon as five huadred shares shall be sub: scribed, the persons hereby authorised to receive subscriptions shall call a meeting of the subscribers, giving two weeks notice, in two of the papers printed within the district; and the subscribers, who shall assemble in person or proxy, shall choose, by ballot, from among the stockholders, by a majority of votes, twelve directors, who shall continue in office until the first Monday in June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and nineteen; on which Monday in june, in every succeeding pear thereaf ter, an election shall be held for twelve directors, as aforesaid, who shall continue in office for doe year from the time of their election, and until other? be chosen in their stead. And the said directors, at their first meeting, shall choose, from among themselves, or from the stockholders at large, a president and allow him a reasonable compensation for his services; and in case of death; removal, resignation, or other disqualification, of the president or any of the directors, the remaining di rectors may elect others to supply their places, during the remainder of the term for which they were chosen; and in every case, where one of the directors shall be chosen president, the vacancy shall be supplied, as in the case of death, removal, or resignation. That the persons hereby authorised to receive subscriptions, or any three of them, be a committee to superintend the first election of directors, and a committee of three stockholders, the legal representatives of Hubert Rowel not being directors, be appointed by the be, and they are hereby, confirmed to their directors, to superintend every succeeding election.

Sec. 5. And be it further enacted, That the president and directors shall have power to ordain and make such by-laws, ordinances, and regulations, as shall appear necessary, for regulating and conducting the concerns of the company, not being contrary to this act, or the laws and constitution of the United States. And the funds of the company, as they shall arise; may be vested in the funded stock; of the United States, or of any individual state, or in stock of any incorporated bank.

Sec. 6. And be it further enacted, That the members of the company shall not be liable for any loss, damage or responsibili ty, other than the property they have in the capital or funds of the company, to the amount of the shares respectively held by them, and any profits arising therefrom not divided: Provided, the said corporation shall, from time to time, apply all sums of money received by them, for pre-miums, to the payment of losses, in the first instance, and to make up the amount of their original capital, whenever it shall have suffered any diminution by losses.

Sec. 7. And be it further enacted, That the president and directors, for the time being, shall have power to dispose of, according to the provisions of the second section of this act, the shares which may remain unseld at the formation of the company; and they shall have power, also, to provide, by purchase, or otherwise, a suitable place for any office, to make all rules and regulations for conducting the busi-

And be it further enacted, That the said president and directors shall conduct business in the city of Washington; that they shall keep proper books, and record their proceeding therein; that on the first Monday of May, and the first Monday of November, in every year, after the first year, they shall declare a dividend of so much of the clear profits as they may deem adviseable, and within ten days thereafter shall pay the same to the stock-holders; but it shall not be lawful for the said president and directors to include, in such dividend, the premiums of any risk which has not actually terminted, nor to divide more than two-thirds of the clear profits, until, by the half yearly appropriation of the other third thereof, a contingent fund of twenty thousand dollars shall be formed; and as often as the fund shall be impaired by losses, the said presi-dent and directors shall continue the halfyearly appropriation aforesaid, until it be returned to the amount before mentioned.

Sec. 9. And be it further enacted, That every director who shall be present at the declaration of any dividend in violation of the eighth section of this act, shall be individually answerable to the stockholders for the injury resulting therefrom, unless his protest be recorded in the books of the corporation.

Sec. 10. And be it further enacted, That in case any action shall be prosecuted on any insurance made by virtue of this act, it shall be deemed sufficient service of such process to leave a copy thereof with the president or secretary for the time being, and all recoveries had in any such ac-

tion or actions shall be conclusive on the

company, so far as to render the stock and property of the company liable, and

no further. Sec. 11. And be it further enacted, That this act shall be and continue in force for and during the term of twenty year, froin and after the passing thereof, and until the end of the next session of Congress. and on the dissolution or expiration of this charter, the president and directors, for the time being, shall take prompt and effectual measures for closing all its concerns; but no such dissolution or expiration shall operate so as to prevent any suits to be brought or continued by or against the said corporation for any debt or claim due by or to the same, and which arose previously to said dissolution or expiration, but for the purpose of closing its concerns its corporate powers shall remain unimpaired.
