AN ACT supplementary to an Act, entitled "an Act concerning Navigation.'

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Re esentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, from arid after the thirtieth day of September next, the ports of the United States shall be and remain closed against every vessel owned wholly, or in part, by a subject or subjects O his Britannic Majes ty, coming, or arriving by sea, from any port of place in the province of Lower Canada, or com ing or arriving from any port or place in the province of New-Brunswick, the province of Nova-Scotia, the islands of Newfoundland, St. Johns, or Cape Breton, or the dependencies of any of them, the islands of Bermuda, the Baha maislands, the islands called Caicos, or the dependencies of any of them, or from any other port or place in any island, colony, territory, of possession, under the dominion of Great Britain in the West Indies, or on the continent of Ame in the West Indies, or on the continent of America, south of the southern boundary of the United States, and not included within the act to which this act is supplementary. And every such vessel, so excluded from the ports of the United States, that sliall enter, or attempt to enter, the same, in violation of this act, shall with her tackle, apparel, and turniture, together with the cargo on board such vessel, be forfeited to the United States. ed to the United States.

Sect. 2. And be it further enacted, That., from and after the thirtieth day of September next the owner, consignee, or agent, of every vessely owned wholly, or in part, by a subject or subjects of his Britannie Majesty, which shall have been duly entered in any port of the United States, and on board of which shall have been there laden, for exportation, any article or articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture, of the United States, other than provisions and seistores, necessary for the voyage, shall, before such vessel shall have been cleared, outward at the custom bouse, arise head, in the custom-house, give bond, in a sum doubte the value of such article or articles, with oile or more sureties, to the satisfaction of tile collector, that tire article or articles so laden on lector, that the article of articles so laden on board such vessel; for exportation, shall be land-ed in some port or place other than a port or place in any province, island, colony, territory, or possession, belonging to his Britannic Ma-jesty, that is mentioned or described in this acty or in the act to which this act is supplementary.

And every such vessel that shall sail, or attempt to sail, from any port of the United States without having complied with the provision aforesaid, by giving bond as aforesaid, shall with her tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with the article or articles aforesaid, laden or board the same as aforesaid, be forfeited to the United States. Provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed or construed so as to violate any provision of the Convention to regu-late Commerce between the territories of the United States and of his Britannic Majesty, sign, ed the third day of July, one thousand eighthundred and fifteen.

Sect. 3. And be it furher enacted, That, from and after the thirtieth day of September nest? no goods, wares, or merchandise, shall be imported into the U ited States of America from the province of Nova scotia, the province of New-Brunswick, the islands of Cape Breton, St. Johns, Newfoundiand, or their respective de pendencies, from the Bermuda islands, the Ba-hama islands, the islands called Caicos, or either or any of the aforesaid possessions, islands, o' places, or from any other province, possession plantation, island, or place, under the dominio of Great Britain in the West Indies, or on the continent of America, south of the southern continent of America, south of the souther boundaries of the United States, except only such pods, wares, and merchandise, as are trely and wholly of the growth, produce, or manufacture, of the province, colony, Plantation, is land, possession, or place, aforesaid, where the same shall be laden, and from whence such goods, wares, or merchandise, shall be directly imported, into the United States; and all goods, wares and merchandise, invosted or attempted. wares, and merchandise, imported, or attempted to be imported, into the United States of America contrary to the provisions of this act, together with the vessel on board of which the same shall be laden, her tackle, apparel, and furnitul shall be forfeited to the United States.

Sect. 4. And be it further enacted, That the form of the bond aforesaid shall be prescribed. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Residue or service as aforeout the same shall be discharged, and all penalties and forfeitures, meurred under this action all be sued fur, recovered, distributed, and accounted for, and the same may be mitigated, or the same may be mitigated.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Re-presentatives of the United States of America in Gaingress assembled, That there be granted to the state of Ohio, at the minimum price for which the public lends are said the right of the state of Ohio, at the minimum price for which the public lands are sold, the right of pre-emption to one quarter section, in or near the centre of each county, included in the purchase recently made of the Indians, by the treaty concluded at St. Mary's, on the twentieth day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, for the establishment of a seat of justice in the said counties: Provided, The purchase he made before the commencement of the chase be made before the commencement of the public sales: And provided also, That the proceeds of the sale of each quarter section, which ceeds of the sale of each quarter section, which may be made under the authority of the state of Ohio, shall he appropriated for the purpose of erecting piblic buildings in said counties, respectively, after deducting therefrom the sums originally paid by the state aforesaid: And provided further, That the seat of justice for said counties, respectively, shall be fixed on the lands so

That so much of the first section of the act of Congress passed on the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, entitled "An act making reservation of certain public lands for naval purposes," as empowers the Secretary of the Navy to appoint an agent or agents and surveyor, be, and the same is hereby, repealed; and the duties and services required by said section be performed in future by such surveyors of public lands as may be designated by the President of the United

Re it enacted by the Senate and House of Re presentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, for the purpose of carrying into effect the stipulation contained in the fourth article of the treaty concluded be-tween the United States and the Chippewa nation of Indians, on the twenty-fourth of September, one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, and which was ratified by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, on the twenty-fifth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty, there be, and hereby is, appropriated the sum of one thousand dollars, to be paid in silver, annually, forever, to the said Chippewa nation.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That there

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Re-presentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the first, second third, and fourth, sections of an act, entitled "An act to protect the commerce of the United States and punish the crime of piracy," passed on the third day of March, one thousand eight hiundred and nineteen, be, and the same are here-by, continued in force, from the passing of this act for the term of two years, and from thence to the end of the next session of Congress, and no longer.

sec. 2. And he it further enacted, fhat the fth section of this act be, and the same is hereby, continued in force, as to all crimes made punishable by the same, and heretofore committed, in all respects. as fully as if the duration of the said section had been without limitation.

Sect. 3. And be it further enacted, That, if any person shall, upon the high seas, or in any open roadstead, or in any haven, basin, or bay, or i any river where the sea ebbs and flows, committee crime of robbery in or upon any ship or vessel, or upon any of the ship's company of any ship or vessel, or the lading thereof, such person shall be adjudged to be a preate; and being there of convicted, before the Circuit Court of the United States for the district into which he shall be brought or in which he shall be found, sha suffer death. And if any person engaged in any piratical cruize or enterprise, or being of the crew or ship's company of any piratical ship envessel' shall land from srich ship or vessel, and on shore, shall commit robbery, such person shall be adjudged a pirate; and, on conviction thereof, before the Circuit Court of the United States for the district into which **he** shall be brought, or in which he shall be found, shall suffer death: Provided, That nothing in this sep tion contained shall be construed to deprive and particular state of its jurisdiction over such of fences, when committed within the body of county, or authorizes the United States to try arly such offenders, after conviction or acquittance, for the same offence, in a state court.

That if any citizen of the United States, being of the crew or ship's company of a y foreign ship or vessel engaged in the slave trade, or any person whatever, being of the crew or ship's company of any ship or vessel, owned in the whole or part, or navigated for, or in behalf of, any citizen or citi-zens of the United States, shall land, from any such ship or vessel, and, on any foreign shore seize any negro or mulatto, not held to service or labor by the laws of either of the states or or labor by make such negro or mulatto a slave, or shall decoy, or forcibly bring or carry, or shall receives such negro or mulatto on board any such ship of vessel, with intent as aforesaid, such citizen of person shall be adjudged a pirate; and, on convic tion thereof, before the Circuit Court of the U1 ted States for the district wherein he may be

brought or found, shall suffer death.

Sec. 5. And **be** it further enacted, That if any citizen of the United State., being of the crevior ship's company of any foreign ship or vesse engaged in the slave trade, or any person what ever, being of the crew or ship's company of any ship or vessel, owned wholly or in part, or navi gated for, or in behalf of, any citizen or citizen of the United States, shall forcibly confine or detain, or aid and abet in forcibly confining or detain. taining, on board such ship or vessel, any negro or mulatto not held to service by the laws of either of the states or territories of the United States, with intent to make such negro or mi latto a slave, or shall, on board any such ship of vessel, offer or attempt to sell, as a slave; any negro or mulatto not held to service as aforesaid, or shall, on the high seas, or any where on

gro or mulatto a slave, or shall land, or deliver on shore, from on board any such ship or vessel, my such negro or mullatto, with intent to make sale of, or having previously sold, such negro or mulatto, as a slave, such citizen or person shall, be adjudged a pirate; and, on conviction thereof, before the Circuit Court of the United States for the district wherein he shall be broughtor found, shall suffer death.

AN ACT extending the time allowed for the re-demption of Land sold for Direct Taxes, incertain cases

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Reresentatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the time allowed for the redemption of lands which have been, or may le, sold for the payment of taxes, under the act passed the ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, so far as the same regards the direct tax of six millions of dollars, laid in that year, or under the act passed the fifth day of varch, one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, so far as the same regards the direct tax of three millions of dollars, had in that year; and purchased on behalf of the United States, be extended three years beyond the time heretofore allowed Provided, That such extensicin of time shall not be beyond the first of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one and that on such redemption interest be pad at the rate of twenty per centum per annum, on the taxes aforesaid, and additions of twenty per centum chargeable thereon; and the right to redes shall enure as well in persons holding an equitable or reversionary interest in lands so purchased on behalf of the United States as to the orig nal owners thereof.

Sec. 2. And bein further enacted, That where any person or persons, mho-has or have purchased, lands or tenements sold for the nonpayment of the direct tax, shall be entitled to have a deed for the same, but, from the death or remove al of the collector, or from any other cause, there is no officer who, by the existing laws, is authorized to make a deed, it sliall be lawful for such person or persons to apply, by petition, to the, District Judge of the district in which such lands or tenements are situate, setting forth the circumstance of the case, and, upon due proof being made, to the satisfaction of such judge. that such person or persons, is or are a purchaser or purchasers as aforesaid, and has or have fully complied with all the coiditions of sale, and is or are entitled to hare a deed, and that there is no officer who, by the existing laws, is authorized to make such deed, it shall be lawful for such judge, and he is hereby authorized and required, to order and direct the Marshal of the District to make a deed to the purchaser or purchasers, which deed, being acknowledged in open court, and entered of record, shall liave the same effect as if it had been made by the collec-tor or other officer authorized by the laws here-tofore or now in force.

THE QUEEN.

It appears, by the late advices from England that the affairs of the Oueen still occupied the attention of the public and parliament. The London papers are filled with the debates of both branches of parliament upon the measures which have been adopted, and upon those in contempla tion The House of Commons by an extraordinary majority of 391 to 124 has expressed its opinion that the Queen ought to have accepted the terms proposed to her by the ministry. Our readers will recollect that the proposition was, that she should relinquish the title of queen, and choose some spot for her residence on the conti nent, and receive tlie sum of 50,000 pounds annu ally. She is, however, of a different opinion, and has decided to brave the p oposed investigation.

To be vested in one court of appeals presided by three judges; one court of chancery, presided by a chancellor; as marly circuit courts as the legislature shall deem necessary, presided by one judge; & in justices of peace, whose jurisdiction is limited. All the judges to be appointed by the governor. with the advice of the senate; tu hold their offices during good behaviour; antl to have fixed salaries ut not less than \$2000 per annuni each.

EXECUTIVE.;

To he vested in a governor and Lieuten. ant Governor.

The governor to be 35 pears of age; tu be elected by the people; to hald his office four years, aiid to be ineligible the next four; to nominate and with the advice of the senate to appoint an Attorney General, a Secretary of state, some military officers and judges; to have a qualified veto upon the passage of laws; to be a conservator of the peace, arid commander in chief of the military and naval forces of the atate; aiid to have a fixed salary of not

less than 2000 dollars per annum. The lieutenant governor to be elected as the governor; to hold his office fur the same term; to possess the same powers when holding the place of governor; and to

oe president **of** the senate. Great applause is due to the convention for this frame of government. It is better calculated to ensure an able administration of the affairs of the state, and a stable policy in the pursuit of its interests, than the constitution of any state yet formed.
