COMMUNICATION.

Much has appeared in the public papers with regard to economy. The writers inder this head censure our mode of living, and alledge that de live beyond our income, and that our (means are not sufficient to support us in all the extravagancies of human pride—therefore it is neces-sary to consult family economy, work harder, and lire cheaper. As for my own part I do not see how I can live more e-conomical than I do; even if I could, it is not my disposition to pinch my family of bread, or curtail any of the necessaries of my table io order to support men in public office in all their grandeur and extra-

vagancies.
At this time the distresses of the penple require national economy as well as individual. If this is not a time for the making of money, it certainly ought to

a time for the saving of it—money saved is better than money earned. If this is not a time for paying debts, it certainly would be unadviseable to contract new ones, or run ourselves further into difficulties - We had better let a Seventy four rot on the stocks,, than to build her and then be unable to gun and man her.

Let the members of Congress reduce their own wages at least one third; and so, in like proportion, iet them reduce every public officer's salary. Let them at their next session show an example of good economy, and we will cheerfully copy afer it.

Let the Governor or our state recommend to the Legislature a general reduc-tion of salaries and fees—and let the Legislature act faithfully on this recommendation. Thus they will ameliorate the dis-

tresses of the people.

It is not my disposition to find fault with those who are chosen to superintend. our public concerns—if they can gull us with our eyes wide open, we certainly

ought not to complain.. The prosperous state of our country for thirty gears past, has lead us into many extravagancies. We were for many years a neutral power—it made good markets for the farmer's produce—muney plenty business lively; we paid our bills of credit and our taxes without making any enquiry about money—We suffered our members of Congress to raise their wages and lavish away the public money—We suffered the members of the Legislature to increase their own wages, add they; have increased the pay of most of those who were under them. But now the pressure, and the distresses of the people, (net the times) have a tendency more and more to enlighten our understanding. Men are sometimes brought to feel before they can act. The agriculturists are hecoming aroused from their lethargy. Can they support the increasing wages and they support the increasing wages and high salaries?—we answer no: they have just cause of complaint. At this time the neat proceeds of three common Sining-field farms, will not more than pay the

wages of one member of Congress.

It is to be hoped that Congress and the Legislature will, at their next sessions, endeavor to lessen the heavy expenses of government, and practice more frugality than has heretofore been done. Since trade and commerce have broken down, the heavy expenses of government must fall on the land, otherwise they must bor-row money, and thus run us further in-debt, and wait better times for its redemption.

MODE OF PREVENTING HORSES BEING TEASED BY FLIES.

Take two or three small handfuls of walnut leaves, upon which pour two or three quarts of soft cold water; let it intuse one night, and pour the whole next morning into a kettle, and let it boil for a quarter of an hour, when cold, it will be fit for use. No more is required than to moisten a spunge, and before the horse goes out of the stable, let those parts which are most irritable be smeared over with this liquor, viz:-between and upon the ears, the neck, the flanks, &c. Not only the lady or gentleman who rides our for pleasure, will derive benefit from walnut leaves thus prepared, but the coachman, the waggoner, and all others who use herses during the hot months.

Foreign Articles. .

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND. London papers of the Soth July.

Parliament having adjourned, the English papers are chiefly made up of their common matter, such as trials for crimes, erim con. cases, and boxing matches. The following brief notice takes in every thing in anywise interesting which has reached

The papers have many speculations sibout the queen. We have now indications that she is the favorite of the peo

ple. She is preparing for her defence.

The bishop of Winchester, lately de ceased, left 3001, to the poor, of whom it is probable that, in the course of his life he had exacted 30.000. The punishment of transportation, it is supposed. will he aban doned; it no longer excites terror. It was reported that Sir William Kerr, had suffered very severely in a battle with the pirates of the Persian Gulf. Sir William Scott is to retire on a peerage and pension, and to be succeeded by Sir C. Robinson, as judge of the admiralty. A man has been tried and found guilty for using the following language to a body of soldiers: - Those are the last clothes you shall wear. You will never proclaim another king George. D.—n the king. May the skins be torn off the b— huchers, to serve for reformers to heat to arms." A cordon of troops is about to invest London, pending the trial of the queen. and an encampment of 8000 will be formed at Blackheath.

A letter from Holland says that the people of the Hague feel their country degruded, because it has been selected as an asylum for the miserable Italian witnesses against the queen. One of the addresses to the queen was signed by 7,800 persons. In her reply to an address from Morpeth she used the following decisive language-" I humbly solicit, and boldly challenge any open, any legal investigation; and the more my character is investigated, the more I trust it will be found to be intimately embodied with the principles of rectitude. I consider. my rights and privileges as queen consort of the sovereign. part of the sacred patri British nation and I will defend them with intrepid constancy, for their benefit, rather than for m y own gratification.

Though the queen's name is omitted in he liturgy, it is stated that many of the officiating ministers mention her in their prayers before sermon.

I feel a cheering confidence of present support, and of eventual tri-umph in the affections of the people.

"I have been accused of appealing to popular clamor—but I appeal to nothing nat to the good sense and good feeling-fo the reason, the morality, and the patriot ism of the most enlightened and most respectable portion of the community. If I am condemned without justice, and de-stroyed against all law, the liberties of every individual will receive a fatal stab; and the character of the highest judicature will be blasted to the latest posterity.

"My own personal welfare is of little moment; hut I do feel as a queen for the public welfare, which is deeply implicated in the vindication of my violated rights.

"The power which the house of lords are assuming in their bill of pains and penaities, not only of divorcing his majes-ty's royal consort. hut of dethroning their lawful queen, 'may prove in the result. productive of an age of misery to the nation. The child that is now at the breast may live to rue its consequences.

"The consciousness of rectitude. of which no bill of pains & penalties can ever deprive me, will support me through all trials; and even though the force of my enemies should, in the, end, prove commensurafe with their malignity, the people shall never have occasion to reproach me with neglecting their happiness, with betraying their rights, or with relinquish ing. for one moment, the patriotic magna-nimity of the queen."

But upon a little further consideration, they now think that the Legislature must be considered as speaking upon the 3d of March, and saying, every person that may be arrested in a civil suit shall be discharged, provided, &c. that the phrase may be arrested, both in its grammatical construction, and in its uniform acceptation in common discourse, means the same thing, as shall hereafter be arrested; and that therefore the legislative declaration contained in this act, is that every person that shall hereafter (that is after the 3d March) be arrested in any civil suit, shall be discharged: &c. All persons, then, who shall have been arrested after that time, are the subject upon which the act is to operate, the persons to whom it is to afford ease and benefit; and although its operation in that respect be postponed from that time till the fourth of July, yet the subbject, upon which it is then to operate, is not at all changed; the persons to same, that is, those arrested after the Sd Tof March.

From this view of the case the Court are now disposed to say, that the defendant is entitled to the benefit of that act upon the terms therein prescribed; and apon his having, in all things, fully complied therewith, that he is entitled to be discharged accordingly.
