Communicated for the Baltimore Chronicle. From South America.

General Devereux, with his staff and uite, arrived at Baranquilla on the 3d o August. On the 10th he despatched Col Hall and Major Bennett, aids de-camp attached to his staff, with letters for the president at Cucuta—these officers met his excellency at Monpox. He received them with the greatest politeness, and in vited them to accompany him back to Baranquilla, where he arrived on the 23d inst. and the enthusiastic rejoicings of all ranks and descriptions of the inhabitants, whose blessings and acclamations had attended him through every part of his jour-ney down the Magdalena. On his meeting General evereux, he embraced him in his arms and expressed in the warmest terms, his high sense of the General's exertions in the cause of the republic. Exertions, he observed, which had been equalled by no single individual! He said he had known adversity, and disclaimed the idea of considering the General less for the defection of a part of his legion, and invited him with the few men still remaining, to join the main army at Cucuta, and lead the division of his legion, which had arrived on the Apura, by way of the Oronoco.

The general's guard of officers and sol

diers formed a guard of honor for the President, during his stay at Baranquilla—he quitted it on the 24th for Turbacco, to inspect the blockading squadron of Carthagena, and is expected to return before the expedition sails from Baranquilla, against Santa Martha.

All the promotions the general thought proper to make since his arrival, were confirmed by the president. The cadets of his guards, which principally formed the guard of honor to his excellency, were all promoted to the rank of cornets. guard was commanded by cornet O'Connor, who was promoted to the rank of lieutenant—this young man, we under-stand to be the son of the celebrated Irish patriot of that name.

Letters from China, say, that British manufactures are getting into high fashion and demand in that Empire; and some American houses are coming in for a share of gain.

London, Aug 29.

A schism of considerable extent appears to have taken place among the Methodists in the northern counties, as well as in the south, owing principally to the folly of some of their preachers, in interfering with the political opinions of the people. This began about the latter end of last year. when their committee of privileges in London, in concert with his majesty's govern ment issued circulars to the different preachers in the connection, in all parts of the country, to discountenance amongst their people all those who might be attached to political reform. Immediately the methodist pulpits every where resounded with the murderous doctrines of passive obedience and non-residence-those doctrines which in England brought one tyrant to the block, and obliged another to abdicate the throne. In consequence of which added to the tyranny of the preachers and their exorbitant exactions from the people, few of whom are opulent, great numbers have separated from the dody. & formed a new community, under the de-nomination of "Independent Methodist;" maintaining the same discipline, but dif-fering in church government; as their preachers, like the primitive feachers of Christianity, claim no pecuniary reward for their labours. In Shields, Newcastle and their vicinities, they are rapidly incaeasing, and have already 14 chappels and places of public worship, which are supplied by 21 preachers.

MR, GUILLE'S ASCENSION.

I started at 3 o'clock, and 35 minutes, on Saturday afternoon, the 14th of October. By some mistake, and many people interfering to assist me in ascending balloon lost a considerable quantity of the gaz. In less than five minutes I ascended to the distance of 1000 feet, when the earth disappeared to my view, there was not a sufficiency of distance between my situation and the earth, that to disengage myself from the balloon would have been attended with great danger. When I first discovered the earth, I descended so rapidly, owing to the balloon being so heavy, that my parachute opened itself. When I got to the ground, in an open field, and having no grappling irons, I was dragged about the distance of Market street, until the balloon was arrested in its course by a forest, where, with the assistance of some persons I was able to get out of my basket and secure the balloon Mr. Ralph H. DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

Chilicothe, (Ohio) Sep. SO.

On Thursday evening last, a fire broke out in the factory owned by Mr. David McComb, on paint creek, in this vicinity, which, we are sorry to say, has laid in ruins this valuable establishment. All the necessary machinery for carding and spinning cotton and wool; weaving, fulling, dying, together with a grist mill, have been destroyed. Through the exertions of the Fire Company and some other citizens, the two main water wheels, drawing head, roving frames, cards, and other articles, valued in all at \$1000, were preserved. The whole loss is estimated at fifteen thousand dollars.

Fears are entertained that Mr. Timoothy Pickering, the fuller employed in the factory, has perished in the flames as he has not been heard of since the firey and the last time he was seen, was entering the factory for the purpose of endeavoring to save property.

Extract of a letter from Savannah, dated Sep. tember 23.

" It is with much pain I inform you that Mr. Harrison is no more-he expired last night about 10 o'clock, and we buried him at 11 this day; he had the black vomit. The sickness here for the last month has amounted to almost a plague. We have lost one very valuable physician, Dr. Berrien—he died on Wednesday morning last; he bid fair to be an ornament to his country; he died in a good cause—exerted himself in attending the sick beyond what his constitution would bear. - His mother in-law, Mrs. Delony, died about 30 hours before him, in the next room. You cannot conceive the distress Mrs. B. was in, just up from a sick bed, with an infant not yet a month old, and to lose a mother in four days and a husband in five days sickness. was truly an affliction.

We have lost many, very many, valuable citizens, and young men, who bid fair to become ornaments to society.

Our city has become almost totally deserted. There is not probably more than one thousand white inabitants here; and yet the number of deaths for the last few days have been from 10 to 12 a day.—The deaths amongst the whites, from 1st to

Two of our physicians have already left us, and one or two others are talking a going. Mr. Arbel, the music master, a man much esteemed here, died to day. The fever carries them off in from three in six days sickness, and there has been scarcely one cure effected in these violen cases. Dr. Kollock informed me last even ing, that he had spent 29 years here, and says he could not possibly have imagine such fevers could have existed in any country.
