

These added to the number which have arrived at the different ports in the United States, cannot fall any short of 50,000, which have emigrated from Europe, within the last year.

Latest from Cadiz .- The ship Fanny, captain Williams, in a short passage from Cadiz, bound to New-York, put into New Haven on Sunday, the 17th inst. Capt. W. is the bearer of despatches from our Minister at Madrid. The only information gathered from this arrival is, that Mr. Forsyth will remain at Madrid until further instructions shall have been received from the president; that the Spanish king did not in fact refuse to ratify the treaty for ceding the Floridas, but sutfered the time limited for that purpose to elapse, with an understanding or an ex pectation that the United States would consequently avail herself of the Floridas by immediate occupation; that Ferdinand was induced to this passive measure, in consequence of the interference of the British government, which had put in its claim for the cession of the Island of Cuba, or for some other equivalent, as an offset to the proposed cession to the United States.

He engaged in the service of a Tu k, who, being pleased with her conduct, considered him as a proper obect for exercising his influence in convert-ing him to the Mahometan faith. After bolding out great offers, he ultimately prevailed on him to renounce Christianity, in he presence of the Meccamay, who is the Turkish Judge and Bishop. He continued in the service for a year alter, when he united it, and having experienced severe reprosis of consolence for his apostacy, he made a pligrimage to Mount Achas, where te are many Convents, from which h Beturned some months after. On his arrival at Smyrna, in the costume of a Greek monk, he proceeded instantly to the Meccamay, expressed his repen fance at renouncing the Christian faith, hand his resolution to abjure the teners of the Mahometan. On this, he was confined the dungeon, and endured the torture with the greatest fortitude, persisting in he resolution to die a Christian.
