By Kur a rival at New-York we learn, that the examination of witnesses against the Queen had been continued before the House of Lords up to the 7th of September; that on the 8th, Mr. Brougham moved the House for time to bring forward the witnesses on the part of the Queen that on the 9th this motion was acceded to, and the House accordingly adjourned to the 3d of October-

That Addresses from England, Scotland and Ireland, continued to flow in, to the Queen; and that one from Sheffield contained ten thousand signatures of fe-

males—

It exhibits a cloud on the edge of the political horizon that may burst in misery on every family in the country.

This bill of Pains and Penalties may thus be the harbinger of woe to every man's hearth; it may imbitter he cays of thousands and tens of thousand body rich and poor, and produce irremedialle re-

grets.

((After the noble stand which so many of the most estimable among the! Peers have made agaiiist this pestiferois bill and the total wan! of any evidence to jus tify its enactment, it cannot be expected that it will pass; but if it should pass, we must never lose sight of the probability that his Majesty may marry again—the isse of that marriage would, in all likehood, cause a contested succession. I have often been amused at the sudden & complete metamorphosis made by some aPP"intments to office. The caudidate may have used all possible dilligence in his private concerns—may have pursued vocations incessantly from early in the morning until late at night-but the moment he is invested with a public office, & becomes a public servant, instead of doub ling his dilligence, or at least not slacken-ing his pace, he becomes comparatively indolent and tardy—confines his labors to certain hours—and sets himself up'as the master of those whose sourreignty he had confesaed when he was soliciting them to appoint him their agent!

I hold to this as a manifest truth, and one which ought to be kept constautly in view, ther in this country the people are the sovereigns; and that every trust they delegate ought to be executed agreeably to their wishes, interests and convenience. I consider it equally undeniable that eve. ry person who accepts an office from the people should continually bear is mind that be takes it in trust for their benefit, and is hound by every obligation of justice and gratitude to conduct it so as to produce the greatest possible degree of advantage convenience, and satisfaction to them These are the only principles on which an office can be safely and prudently bestowed; and on which it can be honorably accepted, and faithfully discharged.

These hasty remarks have no personal allusion, or local bearing. They grow out of a practice which has become too general, and produced much dissatisfaction. Whether any legal remedy can be applied, is not for me to say; but public opinion might, I think, go far to correct the evil; and should these observations have a tendency to unite that opinion against the practice,
