By referring to the Proceedings of the Legislature, this day published, it will be seen that the supplement to the insolvent law passed in March last, has been repealed, by a large majority! The people of Cumberland generally appeared to be in favour of this law, which gave the county for the limits. What effect the repeal will have on their minds it is impossible to conjecture. The opinion of the great mass appears to be in favour of abolishing imprisonment for debt altogether.

Since the repeal of the supplement, the insolvent laws stand precisely as they did previous to the 3d of March last. An act repealing the district Judiciary law has passed the House of Assembly, but its -passage in Council is very doubtful. An Act has unanimously passed both branches of the Legislature, authorizing the appointment of Commissioners to meet Commissioners. pointment of Commissioners to meet Commissioners from the state of Delaware, and form an agreement defining the boundaries, jurisdiction, rights to islands, &c. in the bay of Delaware, of the two states respectively.

The Governor of New Jersey has issued a proclamation, appointing THURS-DAY, the 7th day of December next, to be observed throughout this state as a day of public thanksgiving and prayer.

CONGRESSIONAL ELECTION.

On the 7th and 8th instants an election took place in this state, for members of Congress, and Electors of President and Vice-President.
