**THE AMERICAN FLAG.**

It may be interesting to our readers, just now, to learn something respecting the origin of the American Flag. In March 1775, a union flag with a red field was hoisted at New York upon the Liberty pole.

The grand union flag of thirteen stripes, was raised on the height near Boston Jan. 3d 1776. "The regulars (British), did not understand it, but as the King's speech had just been sent to the Americans, they thought the new flag was a token of submission."
