Who are not Citizens of the United States. By a recent decision of Mr. Marty, colored

persons are held not to be citizens duder the Constitution of the United States. But this does deen pos preclude them from being citisens of any particular State, which chooses to bestow upon them. that privilegel Beveral of the States accordingly pouceds to them the privilege, including the right of suffrage. Some of the States have the twented foreign. ors freshly arrived with preogative of suffrage and with other marks of chigenship. But these State laws have no affect to make such colored persons, or such immigrants citizens of the United States. Such foreigners can only become so by complying with the laws of naturalization; while colored persons, being held not to be within the purview of the Constitution, which commences with the phrase, "We, the people of the United States," cannot become citizens by any process whatever. They are " not people of the United States in the sense of the Constitu-
