RAIL ROADS.

We learn by the Salem papers that energetic efforts are now making to secure the construction of a railroad from Salem to meet, and connect with the West Jersey road. The law authorizing a company to build such a road was passed last winter, but until quite recently, the matter seems to have attracted but little attention. Our neighbors have become so accustomed to their semi-daily intercourse with the city during the business season of the year, that the embargo placed upon their trade and travel during the winter, seems to set rather heavily upon them and some little show of spirit seems actually to be manifested by our venerable foggy state. Whether the present movement will accomplish anything more than a large amount of newspaper gas, is by no means a certainty. The company may be, and undoubtedly is, able enough, as the papers claim, to build the road without any outside help. But, even if so, the wealth and ability seem to be almost hopelessly concentrated in venerable hands who look with distrust upon modern improvements and whose grip to be relaxed, must be positively certain of at least six per cent on the investment in good hard rhino. The collateral advantages, such as rise in the value of property and cheapness of getting produce to market at all seasons of the year, at a reduced cost, there, as here, are too much lost sight of, by the landholders and capitalists who would be most benefited by its construction. But if our neighbors want a railroad, they are perfectly welcome to it, that is, if they can get it. But if Salem, only four and a half hours distant from Philadelphia, and with its present facilities for daily intercourse, needs a railroad, surely we have a much greater need of one. By water, their steamboats have to go daily but about fifty miles, while here they would have to go a hundred. But notwithstanding this, we believe a boat would pay well to run from this place to Philadelphia. The main difficulty seems to be to make steamboat owners think so; and as the distance by water will probably not be shortened for some time to come, we call attention to the importance of securing speedy land transportation. We have been informed however within the past few days that a reliable Co. have agreed to run the Steamer Express, between this place and Philada.—She has been overhauled and greatly improved, is now at Baltimore and is expected to leave for this place on the 9th of next month. The West Jersey Railroad is completed to Woodbury, and possibly may be continued to Glassboro. But the idea of its being built any further by the Monopoly will be realized about the time the moon is shown to be made of green cheese; and greener than the greenest cheese is the individual who still expects the Monopoly to build the road after having so readily accomplished their own measures, namely: the extension of their monopoly privileges and the defeat of the Air Line. So that like the farmer with his wheat, if we want a railroad, we must depend upon ourselves to build it. Can we do it? Unquestionably we can, whenever the landholders and capitalists say they will do it. But until they do, we shall have to trudge along the old fashioned way, unless the unlooked for sympathy of somebody else, should kindly commiserate our situation. The distance from Bridgeton to Glassboro is about twenty miles, and to build and equip a road that distance would cost about two hundred and forty thousand dollars; a pretty considerable sum in the eyes of men like editors who don't handle much money. Labor and a part of the material needed in its construction could be partly supplied along the route and taken in payment for stock. Very nearly all the land along the route is susceptible of a high degree of improvement, and would be greatly enhanced in value by the construction. With the increased facility for getting produce to market and manures to the land, farms would unavoidably increase in value. At least one hundred thousand acres of land contiguous to the route, would have five dollars added to each acre in value; a sum more than double that required to build the road and put it in running order. So that if all those living along it could catch the Kansas or some other western fever, and want to sell out Jersey stock clean, they had better build the West Jersey Road first, and the surplus or extra value of their farms, after building the road and paying the bill, would buy at government price, twice the land claimed here to have been benefited by it, and leave the present value of their farms to provide the "fixins." We presume, no person at all acquainted with the result of establishing railroads thro a section of country will say that we have exaggerated the value imparted to land, and for the rest of the resolution any one acquainted with the four elementary rules of arithmetic, can cipher it out for himself. To run a road to Salem—would require four miles less of road and fifty thousand dollars less expenditure, and would withhold run through a better agricultural country, but one not so destitute of market facilities.

We do wish, landholders, particularly those along either of those routes, would look at

the matter earnestly, and see if upon examination even that vital part, the pocket, would not be vastly benefited by such an enterprise!
