Take in consideration the wonderful effect of Music when associated with language of the proper cast, and you will at once come to the conclusion that the period has arrived for music no longer to be regarded only as an accomplishment, but one of the requirements of a Christian Elucation. The city of Boston is thought to contain better vocalists than any other city in the Union, merely on account of such instruction being faithfully given for the last twenty years in her public schools.

The study of music, by some, is considered a superfluity. But fresh air was formerly thought to be so. Twenty five years ago, in school houses fifteen feet by twenty, were found forty or fifty young prisoners cooped up for seven gloomy hours, on a winter's day, submitting only from compulsion and want of humane efforts of the community to ameliorate their condition. But happily, many praisworthy changes in this respect have been recorded during the past ten years, and I hope the introduction of instrumental music into all places of divine worship, will before long, not only become general, but viewed as necessity towards the praising of God with our whole soul and abilities.
