(BY AUTHORITY.) SUPPLIMENT to an act outitled "An act for the government and regulation of the State Prison," approved April sixteen,

eighteen hundred and forty-six. 1. BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey. That hereafter the salaries authorized to be paid to the keeper, deputy keepers and assistants, physician, and clerk of the state Prison. shall be paid monthly, in the manner pre-scribed by law, instead of quarterly as hereto-

3. And be it enacted! That so much of the act to which this is a supplement, as is inconsistant with this act, be and the same is hereby encaled.

And be it enacted, That the moneys arising from said sale shall be paid into the court of chancery, and the securities and mortgages for any part unpaid, shall be deposited with the clerk of the court; and all such moneys shall be kept at interest on security by bond and mortgage on real estate within this state, worth, besides destructible improve. ments, double the amount invested, and the interest thereof, or such part of the interest as the chancellor may direct, shall be paid to the person or persons who would for the time being according to the limitations of said land have been entitled to the particular estate therein in proportion to their respective shares therein; and such securities shall be taken in the name of the chancellor of New Jersey and the interest shall be paid on the samo half yearly or otherwise, directly to the porsons entitled to the same, unless otherwise directed by the chancellor, who shall from time to time make such order for the investing of said money and the payment, of the interest thereon, as equity and justice may require.

Dr. Fithian's Lecture at Shiloh.

DR. FITHIAN of Greenwich, delivered the sixth lecture in course, before the Union Literary Society of Shiloh, on Wednesday evcning April the 8th. Our space is too limited to do the lecturer or his subject justice .-Could we present to our readers the entire manuscript, we are sure that it would be universally read and admired, but as this is impossible we will notice a few points such as we may be able to pen from memory.

After a very brief introduction, the speaker announced as his subject, the advantages of a rural over a city life, as regards pleasure, health, morality, &c. He first alluded to the fact that youth is sanguine, the time for castle building, but soon to be dissipated by advancing time. That the young are inclined to look forward to the time when they will occupy an exalted position, at the bar, or in the mercantile profession, and would deem themselves stooping too low to follow the plough, to sow the seed, and to till the soil. The speaker observed that this is a great mistake; that there is no profession, no calling, more honorable, or which will afford more pleasure than tilling the soil; that when we can live without food, then may we despise this time-honored employment. The various productions of agriculture were enumerated, all of which give life and support to the manufacturer, the mechanic, and the different employments of man. The merchant with his extensive warehouses depends almost entirely upon the agricultural interests of the surrounding country. Should these resources fail, his business would immediately stagnate. Commerce with its white winged messengers, now floating upon every sea, depends almost entirely for its support upon the tiller of the soil. In short, nothing would be so destructive to a nations interest, as to strike from it its agriculture. Nothing therefore is more worthy the ambition of youth.
