The Banks of Canada are solid and permauent. You have no need of detection, for their notes are beyond suspicion. I find no spurious coin, except in United States money. Quite plenty of money seems to be in circulation. There are three or four sorts of currency, Canadian, Halifax, York, and British. which make it very perplexing to reakon and make change in stores and market. But the government are about to do away with all these, and introduce one uniform decimal system as in the United States.

Western Canada and Western New York. in their general features, are so much alike. that for Jerseymen one description will apply to them both. Having traveled very extensively over every part of both, my opinion, from observation, is that in most respects. regarding soil, climate and population, the one is about as good as the other. The latitude, the climate, and the temperature of the two countries are about the same. They have long winters, and are pretty sure of having snow and good sleighing all winter .-The spring is at least one month later than at Bridgeton, and so lingering that buds, blossoms and pasture, scarcely appear until June. The summer is too slow and short for corn and many other crops to mature with any pertainty. Harvest scarce comes until Autumn. Peaches, melons, and sweet potatoes, will not mature at all. 
