### WHIRLPOOL.

The water was very high, and the silvery form appeared as a sunny cloud. Viewed. from the top of the bank, the Whirlpool appeared like a small place, as a glen seen from some mountain top. At this distant position, the current of the Niagara appears almost like the moderate flow of the Nile in a perspective pisture-a field of gently moving

I felt an indescribable pleasurable sensation. The sun had risen and sent his direct rays over the wide earth, but had not yet shined in here, where these floods were active in performing their morning oblations.

The raging terrent comes down with irresistible momentum, as if the world had had a tilt, or the windows of heaven had been opened. Like a mighty mettled racer, it pitches into this wide gulf as for a place of rest and security from pursuit of thirsty dragons; or as having accomplished the ultimate sim, and exultingly attained the goal. Here for a spell, the water resumes its wonted calmness, turning round and round in the wide basin,

"As if they dreamed of the most peaceful flow To the far distant sea" But there is no room, or rest, or stay for i here, for it is soon crowded out at another opening, where as much takes exit as comes in, and with as much rapidity. The water leaves with as much celerity and force as if it had received a new summous to be quicker on its way to the ocean, lest it might be found to rebel against the everlasting law of Jove, and unbidden overflow, filling the basin and the gulf, committing some tremendous disas-

The turn in the river here, like that at the Falls, makes a right angle, but, as before shown, the course of the river at the Falls becomes perpendicular for a distance, so the turns it forms, are what mathematicians call "perpendicular right angles," while this at the Whirlpool, is a "horizontal" right angle. The water turns this square corner in a most furious hurry, as if with full intent to keep coming behind of superior haste and strength, and as having but a short time in which to clear the way.

The water coming down with accelerated mighty freshet, they drive in agitated fury into the basin, exulting and tessing up heads of foam. They sink again as quick as if in mirthful mimic of some antic feat. But just here they fetch against this square corner such crook as not used to in all their courseand they must go by in this hot haste, like all the world of busy men, in the rapids of rushing life, having much to do in a verv short time.

The water leaves the pool as if driven like bot vapor and smoke from a furnace all rolling in a mass of confused, crowded, riotous waves, as though in bulk they were doing things fast by wholesale. LOSS BY FIRE.

of \$10,000 and upwards were destroyed, so tired. making an aggregate loss of \$953,000. Add to this the amount destroyed by smaller fires ly twenty millions of dollars. When we reflect that nearly the whole of this immense amount is taken directly from the industrial pursuits of the country, it gives a grand idea of the immensity of our industrial pursuits that can bear such a less and still continue prosperous and successful. By a comparison with the census of 1850, it appears that the amount of property annually destroyed in the United States, is equal in value to that of nearly one-third of the entire cotton manufactured-one-third of the iron, two-fifths of the woolen, or three-fourths of the domestic manufactures in the Union. This annual loss is also equal to one-fourth of the capital invested in cotton manufacture, three-eighths of that in iron, and nearly three-fourths of that in woolen, and is greater than the total amount expended for all the schools and colleges in the Union. The property thus destroyed may be considered as a total loss of nearly that amount of capital. Our system of insurance in many instances, prevents the bankruptcy and commercial ruin of the parties, by distributing the loss among different members of the community. Still it is a loss, and is drawn directly from our industrial pursuits. It differs from the losses by bankruptey and fraud, because it entirely annihilates a portion of the capital of the country, so that it cannot be again used, wheras the others only cause capital to change hands, leaving it still in the community for future use. It is a melancholy reflection that a large part of this loss is caused by fires deliberately and maliciously kindled, either for purposes of revenge or plunder. Much the heaviest losses are sustained in large cities. The largest fire during the present year, was vastness of the amount.
