Now, if any ignorant miller was told that his flour would one day be converted into human blood, he would laugh at the notion just as much as if old that any part of his body could be made wailable - as it can-in the manufacture of ucifor matches. There is no external resemblance between the fine white powder which fills his sacks, and the crimson fluid which streams from bis heart. 
