For the West Jersey Pioneer. PHILADRIPHIA, Sept. 28, 1857.

Mr. Editor:—I thought perhaps a few remarks in regard to the Times in general, Philadelphia especially, would be interesting to the readers of your excellent paper, particularly to the inhabitants of Old Cumberland. Our usual quiet city has for several days past

been thrown into considerable excitement caused by the failures of several of our largest business firms, and those who heretofore stood No. Une in commercial circles.

Within a few weeks a large proportion of the manufacturing establishments in the country have been compelled to partially, and in some instances entirely fail. Even in the borough of Manayunk the factories have nearly all closed, throwing thousands of operatives out of employment. I was told from good authority that in Manayunk alone, \$35,000 a month less is paid than last month, and the same will probably continue for some time—causing in many instances, much suffering among the poor. Over 5,000 persons were discharged on last Saturday evening, in South-

In the money circles there has been considerable excitement. Confidence seems quite gone .-On last Friday, at quarter past 10 o'clock, the doors of the Peunsylvania Bank were closed and specie payment suspended. Three Police were stationed at the entrance to disperse the crowd who were continually flocking to the Bank, eager to get the notes redeemed; but the multitude had to go away disappointed. Even the depositers— some who had several thousand dollars deposited -could not realize on it, were greatly disappoint-

In the course of an hour the news was spread through the city in every direction. Person gan to examine their funds to see what Banks their notes were on I heard of one man who rushed home to see if he had any notes on the Bank of Pennsylvania, and when he got home he found he had no notes on any Bank. Just imagine his dilemma. So every Bank had a run, and before 3, P. M., over eighteen hundred thousand dollars in specie were paid out, so great was the fright! The Banks finding something must be done, the officers of the several Banks held a meeting on Priday evening, and agreed to make a general suspension; so on Saturday the Banks did not redeem any but the five dollar bills, except the Mechanics' which paid both checks and notes in specie. To-day several Banks redeemed the small Bank, especially the City Bank, where the crowd reached nearly to Arch st., waiting for their turn to exchange notes for gold and silver. On Monday matters seemed rather more settled. notes, but do not pay the depositors. On Friday there were hundreds collected in front of every

paper currency.
