THE MONEY PANIC.

Since our last publication, scores of banks throughout the country have suspended. The extra session of the Pennsylvania Legislature, which convened at Hsrrisburg last week, legalized the suspension of the banks of that State until the second Monday of April next. Nearly all the New York banks have suspended specie payment. Boston and a large majority of the banks of the Eastern States, have also suspended. A committee from the New York banks has gone to Albany to get the Governor to convene the Legislature for relief. "Amid the wreck of matter and the crush of worlds," our South Jersey Banks still stand firm speciepaying institutions, not with standing they are numbered in the publications of the Wall street brokers, as broken, suspended or doubtful.

Resolved, That we cannot unite with our Pastor in this request, without first giving expression to our deep convictions of the blessedness of his long and earnest ministry among us; most of us have grown up under his pastoral care. His name is associated with our earliest recollections of sacred things.
