Read before the Bowentown Farmers' Club, on the subject of syrup made from Chinese Sugar Cane, and ordered to be printed in the County papers.

MR. PRESIDENT: - Your committee appointed to investigate the subject of molasses made from Chinese Sugar Cane, submit the following report:

First, visited the premises of Mr. Thomas H. Miller. His mill for crushing cane consist of two perpendicular wooden cylinders, eight inches in diameter, with a sweep to attach a horse to, on the principle of the old fashioned cider mill. The boiling apparatus consists of two iron pots and one copper kettle, set in masonwork; the whole being made on a cheap plan for experimenting, and will make from twelve to fifteen gallons per day. The samples examined were good articles.

Next visited Mr. Christian, Myers. The result, as might be expected, is a hybrid. The mongrels are easily distinguished. The pure cane head has the appearance of a cone, while the mixed has a more uniform and a greater length of brush. Thus we would say to persons saving seed for next year, would do well to select pure seed only.

The rapid increase of the cultivation of Chinese Sugar Cane, is beyond precedent; it is estimated at the Pafent office, that there has been from seventy-five to one hundred thousand acres grown the present year in the United States, and from the great success in the manufacture of molasses in proportion to the information we possess on the subject, it must continue to increase in importance, until it works a revolution in the agriculture of our country. We would therefore congratulate you, Mr. President and gentlemen of the Bowentown Farmers' Club, for the interest you have taken in helping forward so desirable an object.

About 71 o'clock this morning a body of Jnited States troops came from Governor's Island and took up their quarters in the basement of the Custom House. They numbered of men, including non-commissioned officers. At the same time 57 marines, including officers, came from the Navy Yard and took ur their quarters in the same place -making 114 in all, to protect the Sub Treasury.
