The intelligence from Europe contains an account of the failure to launch the Great Eastern, or as she has been christened, the Leviathan, while the Adriatic, the new vessel of the Collins line has iust completed a successful trial trip. preparation of the latter vessel for sea had been delayed for just a year by the failure of experiments with new machinery. These it is now thought have been entirely remedied. During her trial trip she sailed about 250 miles, and it is said made 17 miles an hour against wind and tide, with half power. The machinery worked without jar, and is considered nearly perfect. The model of the vessel which was given by the late George Steers' is so excellent and symmetrical that her bows scarcely caused any commotion is the water. Among the improvements which will be used is Prof. Grant's calceium light which will be carried on the foremast and by casting a strong light ahead will serve to prevent collisions. The engines of the Adriatic have two cylinders, each 100 inches in diameter, with 13 feet stroke of piston, and are of the kind known as "inclined oscillators," coupled by simple and direct connections known as the "drag link."

The vessel is the largest wooden steamship in the world. The hull is fitted with watertight compartments, and every precaution has been taken against fire and foundering.

Immense as are the proportions of this vessel, those of the British steamship Leviathan are nearly double and she is construc entirely of iron. Descriptions of her have been so often published that doubtless mos persons are familiar with the particulars.
