DISASTERS IN NOVEMBER The past month has been more prolific of disasters, than any similar period for a long time past. Storms on the lakes and ocean, have destroyed much shipping and caused many a mobile mariner to find a watery grave. The horrors and suffering of shipwreck have been greatly aggravated by the unusual sewarity of the weather. Upon the great lakes, thirty vessels are known to have been lost by severe gales, accompanied with a serious loss of life by freezing and drowning. It is a very rare circumstance to hear of so much id such severe weather, so early in the senson. Added to this the heavy freshets in several of the States, involving the loss of property to the amount of a million of dellars, in some instances sweeping off entire crops, destroying houses, drowning cattle. floating off moveable property of all kinds submerging dwellings, and driving the occupants to the upper stories; and scarcely leave ing the coil itself secure.
