Later from the Plains - The Mormons not going to run away.—Sr. Louis, Jan. 19th.—The Republican has information from Fort Lawrence through an Iudian trader, who arrived at Jefferson City Yesterday, and who reports meeting on the 23d of December 600 or 700 Cheyenne and Camauche Indians returning from Salt Lake to their village on the Biack Walnut Hills, about 80 miles south east of Fort Lawrence. They were accompanied by about 20 Mormon lea-

It was their intention to remain in the camp erected here until spring and then employ themselves under Mormon influence in barrassing and cutting off the supply trains sent to the relief of Col. Johnson.

The Indians had been led to believe that Mormons had 80,000 fighting men well equipped for service. They also spoke of dormon fortifications and a large number of Indian allies, and declared that the Mormons have no idea of running away from Utah.

The Last of the Fillibusters. We learn from the Brother Jonathan that New Yorker, who called himself Colonel the United States steamship of war, the Susquehanns, and were immediately thereafter put on board of a ship bound to Pensacola. Anderson, it will be recollected, was sent up the Colorado river by General Walker, to obtain possession of Fort Castillo, which dssign was accomplished without any great difficulty, as the fortress was completely destitute of garrison and ammunition A few days afterwards, Laving heard that Walker and his men had been hurried off to the United States by Commodore Paulding, Anderson descended toward Grey town, in the steamer Ocean, and when about nine miles above that place, was visited by Captain Sands, of the U.S. frigate Susquehanna, whose force was on board the little steamer Morgan, and ordered to surrender. This order, Anderson of course complied with, inasmuch as he had neither the power or right to dissent; and soon found himself and followers in very comfortable quarters Thus ends the "second lesson" in fillibuster-

ism. Anderson will probably be at home in a few days, but his followers will, in all probability, be left to share such fortunes as shall beset them in the streets of Pensacola and the chapparel of Florida.
