A VISIT TO THE TOMBS.

MR. Epiron:-Thinking that a brief ac count of some of the crimes and criminals of this great metropolis; would not be without interest to your numerous readers, I have

concluded to present the following sketch. A few days since, in company with friend, I visited that far famed, yet dismal place, the Tombe, situated in one of the most central places of New York city. As seen as we had stepped within the inclosure, our attention was called to some ten or fifteen females caged in a strong two horse wagon, who had recently been brought from the Five Points, and were about to be put into a place of confinement. As we compared the manper and conversation of these unfortunate which is characteristic of true womanhood. the contrast at once was toe awful to conof the prison. Here, enclosed within the cells, were probably not less than two hundred criminals, who were guilty of every variety of offence, from netty thefts to capital offences. Here was the youth of ten or sixteen, and the gray haired man of sixty .looking merchant of Broadway. In one cell we saw some ten or a dozen ragged looking boys, who had been committed for burglary.

As we looked into their hardened counterers. As we looked into their hardened countenances, we could hardly conceive how those so one of them, an honest looking fellow, imme-diately left his dinner, which consisted of conce, and is at this moment looking forward facts. don, Conn., and he was the only son of his mother, who was a wilow; that a few years ago they had purchased a house and an acre of land in the suberbs of that city, and had dollars. He said that he had not been at home in three or four months, but had been exerting himself continually to raise the above sum. He had been looking forward with the brightest anticipations to the time when the homestead would be paid for, and then he was expecting to return, settle down, and enjoy the society of his mother. Alas, said he, how changed now are my prospects: instead of being permitted to walk the streets, or page the deck, and breathe the free, pure air of heaven, I am now to be incarcerated for months, and perhaps years, within the walls of a gloomy prison. 
