STAGES AND STAGE DRIVERS. Whatever may have been said derogatory to the Stages of South Jersey years since, will not truthfully apply to those now in use in this part of the State. For several years past, there has been a visible and commendable improvement in the stages running in these parts. Bridgeton new turns out some of the best stages in the country, and those who have not visited this part of the State for a few years past, would be surprised to see the vast improvement which has been made in this particular. The idea in former times, of a journey "through the sands of South Jersey" in a stage coach, was too intolerable to be borne. A pilgrimage to the shades of purgatory would about as soon be tolerated. Not only our stages, but the horses by which they are drawn, are unsurpassed by those of other States. The average time per mile made on the different routes to and from this place, will compare favorably, for speed, with that of almost any other

part of the country. About a year since in speaking of the "Stages and Stage Drivers" of South Jersey, we took occasion to say that:

"There are nine different stage lines from Bridgeton, most of which leave daily, three or four of which go and return the same day. During the past year, great improvements have been made, and some valuable accessions have been added to the number of stages that run from this place. As the populetion of the county increases, the number of eleven o'clock, by breaking out the sash. and passengers is multiplied, and more facilities are required to accommodate the travelling public. These facilities have been furnished quite as rapidly as the times warrant; in fact, the enterprising stage proprietors of the different lines, have made greater outlays for the accommodation of the travelling public, than their income, from that source, would justify.

No class of men in the community perform a greater amount of labor, undergo more hardships, or make more sacrifices, for the amount they receive from the public than do the stage drivers; who at all seasons must be at their post, no matter how inclem, ent the weather, or how anxiously they may desire to be off duty.

There are men now engaged as stage drivers between this place and Philadelphia, who have been on the road for more than 30 years, with close enough application to have secured for themselves a handsome fortune in almost any other business, pursued with one this month. the same steadiness and economy.
