"There is no disguising the limit, that the State is suffering great detriment from the lite relysist of the distribution to low rate of interest which the live prescribes for the greater portly of it; and it is well known that being thereby deprived of the means to draw capital from abroad, or to our maids to tight, and the charges keep our own sapital at home, the enterprise of our citizens is curtailed, and their industry and labor cramped and rendered incapa: ble of developing the large resources at our command. It is also well known that the Usury Law is, for all practical purposes of general usofulness, a dead letter on the statute book-that its frequent violation, and constant evasion, furnishes those who are minds which is ever active, in darkness conwilling to dely the law, an advantage over those who desire to respect it. "Therefore, we think the subject should

sommand, the most earnest attention of the Legislature; it should be fully and fairly discussed, so that the public may be enlight ened, and have all the information necessary to a just conclusion in regard to its advantages or disadvantages.
