At the first, meetings were held on Wednesday only, and attended by six persons.-On the second there were twenty persons, and

on the third Wednesday there were forty.

The time fixed was from twelve to one .-The meetings continued to increase in num bers, until for want of accommodation, other churches and buildings were thrown open for a similar purpose. Individuals visiting the city were accustomed to attend those mectings, and then on their return home, to adopt similar measures in their own churches.-Thus by virtue of the influence of the old Dutch Reformed Church, daily prayer-meetings have been commenced in Philadelphia, Baltimore, Newark, Boston, Providence, Hartford, and other large cities. It has been well said, that a train of events has been set in operation by this venerated church, which

Among the daily meetings which have elicited the greatest share of attention are those which have been held during a few days past at Burton's old Theatre on Chambers street.
