n act regulating the election of overseers of the

highways in the township of Fairfield, in the County of Cumberland. 1. Be if enacted, by the Senate and General ssembly of the State of New ersey, That the overseers of the highways of the several road districts in the township of Fairfield, in the County of Cumberland, shall be elected by the legal voters of the several districts as they may be arranged from time to time by the township committee in said township; and for the purpose of carrying this provision into effect, it shall be the duty of the township committee of the said

township to give public notice of the time and place of holding the first district road meetings under this act, and which meetings shall be held on the Saturday next previous to the annual town meetings in said tonship; and shall cause notice thereof to be posted up in some conspicu-ous place in such district, at least five days before the time of holding any such meeting, which shall be some convenient place in the district, when and where the legal voters in the township residing in such road district, shall assemble for the purpose of such election; and at which time and place such legal voters assembled, having been called to order by any legal voter of the road district, shall proceed viva voce, by the holding up of hand, or by count, to elect a modera-tor of such meeting, by plurality of votes; and
