COLT. In breaking a colt, we should first endeavor to make him conscious of what is required of him. Fettering him with a halter for the first time, placing the saddle up-on his back, fastening the girths, are all matters of paramount importance, demanding the greatest degree of patience, perse-

verance, and an intuitive knowledge of his

idiosyncracies.

Before putting a halter upon a colt, he must be rendered familiar with it by caressing him and permitting him to examine the article with his nose. Then place a portion of it over his head, occasionly giving it a slight pull, and in a few minutes he will be ned to these liberties, and then the halter may be fastened on properly. I teach him to lead is another difficulty. Stand a little on one side, rub his nose and forhead, take held of the strap and pull gently, and at the same time touch him very lightly with the end of a long whip across his hind legs. This will make him start and advance a few steps. Repeat the operation several times, and he will soon learn to follow you by simply pulling the halfer.

SALARIES OF CLERGYMEN.

Some idea of the salaries received by dergymen stationed in the principal cities, may be learned from the amounts paid by some of the congregations in New York. It, is stated on good authority that Henry Ward Beecher has a yearly salary of \$5,000 and a parsonage rent free, and that, with his-iterary earnings, his income is \$12,000 E.

H. Chapin his \$5,000 per annum, and makes outside of his professional earnings. Dr. Adams has \$5,000. Dr. Haws has \$6,000 a year and a house Dr. Taylor has \$10. OUU and a fine pareonage. Rev. Messrs. leading clergymen, receive from \$3,000 to \$6,000 per annum. In many cases the salary only represents a small part of the pastor's earnings.
