Erection of a Monument to the Memory of Late Rev. Ethan Osborne.

The exercises at the Old Stone Church on Saturday last, were witnessed by nearly a thousand persons. One hundred and forty carriages from different parts of the country, were on the ground.

After reading of the 14th hymn, by Rev. Dr. Neill of Philadelphia, prayer was offered in a throne of grace by Rev. Mr. Janvier of Pittsgrove.

Rev. S. B. Jones read two verses of the 90th Psalm, after which an address was delivered by Rev. N. C. Burt, a native of Fairfield. Mr. Burt, though but comparatively a young man, bids fair to rank among the eminent Divines of our country.

The benediction being pronounced by Rev. J. M. Challis of Roadtown, Hon. L. Q. C. Elmer again entered the audience.

As one of the most popular correspondents has favored us with such an interesting production, descriptive of the exercises, we withhold further remarks.

The following is a description of the monument which reflects much credit upon our worthy townsman, G. W. Claypoole.

FRONT.

Erected August 21st, 1858, to the memory of Rev. E. Osborne, born in Littlefield Ct. August 21st 1758; died full of faith, and in the hope of a joyful resurrection, May 1st 1858, aged 99 years 8 months and 10 days.

HAIR SIZE.—Graduated at Dartmouth 1784, licensed 1786, called to Fairfield 1788, ordained 1789, and resigned his charge 1844 having been pastor of this Church 55 years.

BACK.—E. Osborne, a soldier of the Revolution, a good man, a faithful minister of the Gospel.

LEFT SIDE.—He obeyed the command—"Go preach my Gospel." His children in the flesh and in the spirit lie around him.

### TEACHERS INSTITUTE.

The Cumberland County Teachers' Institute is holding its fourth annual session at Millville, under the charge of John B. Thompson, the State Agent of N. J. Teachers' Association.

The Institute was opened at 2 o'clock P. M. on Monday last, and the afternoon occupied with elocutionary exercises.

In the evening a large number of citizens and teachers listened to an able address upon the general subject of Education, from J. S. Van Dyke, Esq., of Princeton. He spoke of the advantages of a general education to the different professions and occupations of life, and the mechanic, the agriculturist and the merchant.

In each of these three employments of mankind, education is the best capital, a fortune which cannot fail.

Some of the essentials of a thorough education, is a proper development of both mind and body, were then given and dwelt upon at length. Among these stood most prominent the important injunction, learn to think.

After speaking at some length upon the impossibility of a free government without a general diffusion of knowledge among the masses, the lecturer encouraged the teachers to persevere in the noble profession which they had chosen, since they would receive the sympathy of all true friends of mankind.

TUESDAY.—The exercises were opened with the reading of the Scriptures and prayer by the Conductor, and the singing of a hymn, and the reading of the opening of the Bible, and Mr. Conner Chorister. The Conductor gave a brief outline of the method of teaching reading, with a drill exercise upon enunciation and articulation. Each exercise occupied three or four hours, and was followed by a recess of a quarter of an hour, most of which was occupied with music.

Mr. Van Dyke then delivered the introductory lecture of the course upon "Physical Geography." He mentioned some of the changes which our earth has undergone since its origin, and which it is still undergoing, explained the manner of formation of corals and volcanic islands, of the Florida and Australia reefs, of the deltas at the mouths of many large rivers, and gave also an account of the most extensive submersions and upheavals of large tracts of land, concluding with numerous illustrations of the great law of nature, "constant changes" which was impressed upon matter in the beginning by the Author of the Universe.

After another recess the Conductor resumed the subject of reading, dwelling especially upon the enunciation of difficult combinations of consonant sounds. At fifteen minutes before 12 the session concluded.

At 2 P. M., Mr. Van Dyke resumed the subject of "Physical Geography," treating especially of the oceans, of the forms and peculiar characteristics of each, of the origin of icebergs and the cause of their southward drift, and the general character of the information respecting the basins of the oceans, and the modes of performing deep sea soundings.

After recess, the Conductor by request illustrated the method of teaching the alphabet, which must be seen and heard to be appreciated. He insisted among other things, that small children should be taught to attach a definite idea to every word, or combination of vocal sounds which they pronounce. He condemned also the practice of sending children to school too early in life, to the great injury of the physical and therefore, also the mental system.

After the next recess, Mr. Van Dyke gave more valuable information respecting the movements of the ocean, of which there are three kinds, waves, tides and currents, assigning the cause or causes of each, and tracing the course of the currents.
