# BAREY ON "BLINKERS."

Mr. Barry having been asked his opinion with regard to the use of "blinkers" on horses, replied in a communication to the London Times, in which he states that his experience with and observation of horses proves clearly that "blinkers should not be used, and that the sight of the horse for many reasons, should not be interfered with in any way." Horses are only fearful of objects which they do not understand or are not tamiliar with, and the eye in one of the principal mediums by which this understanding and this familiarity are brought out.

Isomiliarity are brought out.

They can be broken in less time and better without blinkers, and driven past objects which usually startle them, with far more safety when the eye has an opportunity to examine the object fully. The horse is a better judge of distances than iman, and if allowed the free use of his eyes, would avoid collisions frequently exceed by the carelessness of his triver. Mr. Barry states that the use of the blinkers is rapidly disappearing in the United States, and predicts increased neefulness in the horse when this "folly of the nineteenth century" is abolished in London.
