The Salem County Teachers' Institute has been held during the past week. The attendance of Teachers was small. But more than a usual number of visitors. Lectures were delivered by J. B. Diseased Oysters.

A Wilmington (N. C.) paper states that the oysters and clams, found in the bays and sounds in that vicinity are badly diseased. On opening them "the contents are found to be perfectly black and shriveled up presenting a singular appearance." All classes of animals and even most of the vegetables seem to have their periods of diseases, when some general epidemic seems to carry the same destruction to them that the yellow fever cholera do to us. The same rule holds good we presume throughout all, that they are not positively injurious unless giving some external evidence of disease. As we have heard of nothing of the kind north of North Carolina we presume the bivalves of our own waters are all right yet. A general disease among them would be a public calamity to the shermen. The trade in clams and oysters in Cape May and Cumberland counties is very extensive, furnishing employment to a large number of men and vessels and considerable amount of capital. Oysters are every where regarded as among the most delicious of luxuries. The sea-board towns formerly had an extensive monopoly in the article. But by means of quick transportation the luxury is now extended to inland and Western towns. Fresh oysters are among the modern "institutions" of Chicago. The business of canning oysters is now very extensively pursued in Baltimore, capital to the extent of upwards of a million of dollars being employed in it. It is extremely interesting as society progresses to note the number of different pursuits that are created, and the number of small articles once considered unimportant that are now gradually extended into a lucrative and heavy trade. No article of ordinary consumption too small to form the basis of a profitable business. To the inhabitants of our bays and inlets, nature has been prodigal in her gifts, in the exhaustless supplies of the finest fish and oysters. No where do we find more generous, open hearted hospitality than among the inhabitants who are the recipients of these bounties of nature. Long may they enjoy them.

Rust in Oats.

For the first time in agricultural history of the country we hear of rust in Oats. While nearly every other crop had its enemies and diseases by which but limited returns have been received, this grain has been relied upon as entirely exempt from all of them.

What there has been the present season to induce to diseases of this kind we are unable to conceive. Damp foggy weather has been considered among the leading causes of rust. But the past summer has been remarkably free from fogs, and withal quite dry particularly immediately preceding oats harvest. Not only has rust proved fatal to the growth of the grain, but in some sections the straw is spoken of as having become so poisonous as to be fatal to the stock using it, one farmer having been reported to have lost five horses from partaking of rusted oats.

This seems to us like a strange result. Rusted wheat straw has been thrown out indiscriminately to all kinds of stock, without in any instance, that we have ever heard of having produced any such effect.

Some assert that the rust in the oats is produced by the attack of an insect, and that from this insect the poison is produced. If this is true, another field of research is open to the naturalist, in investigating the habits of the insect and what the best remedy to prevent a spread of its ravages. For the sake of our oat-raising friends, however, we hope this rust will not become permanent. Other articles might not mention it, but we are bound to mention it in a question whether any disease could be entirely eradicated to take their place. Forming a light, wholesome and nutritious food they are particularly adapted to the stock of the West Jersey State.

Take the more trading politician, who, instead of seeking to establish a name for statesmanship; prefers what he thinks the easier path of corruption, and who, though he may secure some petty office, he juggles himself into a fleeting reputation, never leaves behind him the fame of a Webster or a Clay.

Take the plausible, but incompetent merchant, who, though he may for a while obtain credit, finally collapses, recording to all the world what a bubble he has been. We might go through life in the same way, might select examples from every class and profession, and there would be the same. Sooner or later the character will be known. Reputation cannot stand, in the long run, against character. Therefore, always endeavor to be, under any circumstance, as you would wish to appear.
