They do a thousand things now, which their grandfathers would have thought no woman competent to perform. SEC. 5. This act shall not extend to, effect, any lottery which shall be established by or under the authority of the United States, or which has been or shall be estab lished by or under the authority of the legislature of this State.

AN ACT to prevent horse racing. A proved March 19, 1846.

SEC. 1. All racing, by running, pacing, or trotting of horses, mares, or gelding, for money or other valuable thing, or where twenty or more persons are assembled together, shall be, and hereby are declared to be offenses against the state, and the authors, parties, contrivers, and abettors thereof, and all and every other person or persons concerned therein, either directly or indirectly, shall be deemed guilty of Misdemenor, and on conviction shall be punished by fine not ex-ceeding one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, or both, at the discretion of the court."
