THE RAILROAD. The citizens of Millville are agitating the

As a sample of what they intend to do, one man, we learn, has subscribed one hundred thousand dollars toward the construction of a road from Millville to meet the West Jersey road. But few such subscriptions as this are needed to build the entire road. Unfortunately, but few of our citizens are able to subscribe such an amount; that would however be quite immaterial, if all those who would be benefited by its construction would pay in proportion. The road would then be built. We have time and again shown that the advance in the value of the land for a mile in width, on each side of the road, would more than pay for its construction. We have adduced both figures and facts proving conclusively, the value to the country of such an investment, and we have shown that enough surplus capital leaves the county to build the road. From the very first origin of the West Jersey Road, we mantained that if ever built, it must be done by the people themselves. Many differed from us, and thought if the "Air Line" was descated, the monopoly would build the West Jersey Road to Cape Island. The result is nine miles of railroad are constructed, and even the "experimental surveys" of the rest have ceased. The charter for the West Jersey Railroad was granted, we believe, in the winter of '52 and '53, and provides "That if the said railroad shall not be commenced within three years, and be completed at the expiration of ten years from the four:h of July west, ensuing, that then in that case this act shall be void." The road was centmenced within the time, but what prospect is there for its completion. Five and a half years, more than half the entire time has passed, and but nine miles are constructed. At least one year was employed in constructing that. At the same rate of progress for the remaining four and a half years, constantly employed, the road would be but little more than half completed by the expiration of the time. It is therefore clear that the monopoly do not intend to build it .-They are, however, willing to join the road with one or more from the lower counties, and lease its use on very reasonable terms. The road proposed from Millville, is to be located directly to Glassboro or Woodbury, from Glussboro, it would require but about 6 or 7 miles of railroad to bring the road by way of Bridgeton, which, at the estimated cost five thousand six hundred dollars per mile, would amount to but the paltry sum of thirty nine thousand two hundred dollars -Let this amount be subscribed at once, and our offorts be united at once with that of our Millville neighbors, and the road can be secured, and both places benefitted. 
