Extract of a Letter from Washington, Never before Published.

From the New York Ledger. New York, August 26, 1776. "The Enemy, on Wednesday night and dravesend Bay, about ten miles from our work on the Island, and marched through the flat and level land, which is quite free from wood, till they (or part of them) got within three miles of our line, where they are now encamped, a wood or broken linelying between us. What their real design is, know not. Whether they think our works around this city are too strong, and have a mind to bend their whole force that way or whether it is intended as a feint, or is to form a part of their attack, we cannot as yet ascertain. However, I have strengthened the post as much as I can, to prevent a surprise, and have lived the wood between them and us, from whence some skirmishes is dependent upon seeing others happy. have issued, and lives been lost, on both sides. A few more, I should think, would bring matters to an issue, one way or another, or else the season for action will leave them,

as we are verging close upon September.
