A preperation of gum elastic, beeswax, and tallow, in about equal proportions of rosin, beeswax, and tallow, or simply a coating of tar, after the leather is well softened with oil; if put on warm, and well dried in, will make leather nearly, or quite, impervious to water, and will not injure the leather, if not made too hot. Farmers oil and tallow, in about equal proportions, make a very valuable coating for boots and shoes, rendering the leather soft and pliable, and nearly water proof. The puality of the Potato is such that it has already taken its place among the Standard varieties, and must eventually supercede all other older varieties, on account of their productiveness and good quality.—They are an early variety, ripening sufficiently early to enable the farmer to dig them in time to prepare his ground in time to sow wheat and other grain.
