THE NEW YORK OR BROOKLYN YARD This is an extensive establishment, and cost originally \$10,000. A great portion of Brooklyn yard are, frigate Brandywine, stea- In closing, a recapitulation of the original store-ship Relief, and surveying vessels.

THE NORFOLK OR PORTSNOUTH YARD. Was bought in 1799, for \$12,000, and were called on to participate in the last solsloop of-war John Adams; liner Columbus; frigates Raritan; Columbia, and the United States, and one or two smaller craft.

THE PHILADELPHIA YARD.

Stands on the right bank of the Delaware, in the lower part of the Quaker City. CHARLESTOWN OR BOSTON YARD. Situated on the north side of the Charles iver, cover about seventy acres of land. It cost originally \$39,214, and is at present sur-rounded by a massive wall of granite, fourteen feet high. A new and splendid dry dock was completed here in 1833, costing \$670,000. The mouthly disbursements average about \$75,000, of which \$10,000, or therenbouts, go to officers. The entire expenses for 1858, were in the neighborhood of \$900,000. The largest number of hands, employed at any one time, was 1,676, the smallest, 1,400; just now the pay-roll contains a trifle over twelve hundred names which manifest clearly the results of intel-lectual labor. It stands on the loft-bank of the Potomes, near the mouth of the eastern branch, and contains several fine found ries, an extensive armory, and numerous ma-chine shops, in which the engines of the Minnesota, at present in the Bust Indies, were built. Bearing of Fishes.

The Romans, who, after the loss of their liberty, displayed such boundless luxury in the table, did not confine themselves to sending vessels to the neighboring seas, and to receiving fish from the Ionians, inventors of the fish car, which is a kind of floating reservoir for keeping fish alive, but better to secure the supply, the wealthiest citizens constructed immense fish ponds, filled with sea water, in which they deposit the most delicate fishes of Sicily, and even of Greece and Egypt. The Colestial Sphere.

The San is 95,000,000 miles distant from the earth, and a cannon ball, passing at the rate of 1600 feet in a second, would not pass from the earth to the sun, in less than ten years. A body moving with the velocity of sound, would require five years. Light, which moves with the astonishing rapidity of 192, 500 miles in a second, only reaches the earth in about eight minutes and eighteen seconds after loaving the surface of the sun.
Although the sun is so far from the earth, the distance is quite trifling when compared with that of the nearest fixed star, which is about six hundred thousand times more distant than the sun, and a cannon ball, moving at the rate of eight miles a minute, would require 4,000,000 years to pass from it to the earth. The fixed stars are known by their twinkling light, and are so called, because they do not change their place as the planets do.
