Mr. Sharp advocated the bill as follows:-Mn. PRESIDENT: I hope there will be no objections to this bill. I cannot imagine how there can be any, if its merits are properly understood certainly none that should operate upon or influence the minds of honest and independent members of Let us have no nonsense about breaking this body. This bill, Sir, is simply an application to this Legislature to permit the construction of a railroad from Millyille to Winslow, a One such punishment as this will do more good than twenty angry threats or hasty blows.
