For the West Jersey Pioneer. FRUITS, THEECES AND BIRDS.

The interest you take in the cultivation of fruits, induces me to address you upon their gloomy prospects in this part of the world: There was a time when we had great crops of apples, peaches, plums, and cherries, but now none of these do well, and we fear in a few years we shall only know them as things which were. Some days ago I metan old man who told me be thought the cause of their failure was that our woods had been cut off until the orchards were too much exposed to the winds and storms; at the same time, to anstein this opinion, he remark. ed, "I last year had bundreds of different kinds of trees, which bloomed well but bore nothing, while there was one apple tree neglected, growing in the woods, surrounded by high timber, that was full of wellmatured fruit."

I answered him, that the birds that were bere sheltered may have destroyed the insects, and thus saved the fruit. The old gentleman concluded such might have been the case. Formerly peach trees bore well, grew large, and lived to a good old age; but they now die in cight or nine years, andbear well one. The cherry trees suffer much from the black knobs, which form on the twigs and appear to be the nests of insacts I have had thousands of these knobs pulled off to-day; but I can find nothing in them like the eggs or worms I expected were here sheltered, and I am ready to fear if any were in them they have already batched, and perhaps gone into other limbs. Some of our people are digging up their trees, and say it is no use to try and save them from such a
