BRIMMERTVILLE, Lehigh Co. Penn.

Mr. Editor:—Dear Sir, you may not be expecting to hear from an old correspondent, from this far off region, in the old Key-Stone State. But in this age of Railroads, there is no such thing as knowing where a person may be on the morrow. In coming to this place, the conveyance is very direct, by way of the Northern Pennsylvania Railroad, to Allentown; but having been otherwise directed, I found to my sorrow that I had made a mistake. I came on the cars from Philadelphia to Norristown, paying my fare through in the city, taking a ticket for Norristown, and was told that for the rest of the way my name would be on the way bill, and that would be in the possession of the Stage Driver. Going to Norristown, I entered an old Omnibus, badly torn, and very filthy, with three worn down horses. Leaving the town, we plunged into the mud and mire, and such hollowing, whipping, and swearing, was enough to frighten any Jerseyman. The road was literally strewn with what are called turkeys, but literally they are run holes, dens of wickedness and death. They were all patronized by our driver; he took his drink of grog, and his sugar at each, and while we rode with him thirty-six miles, he drank and smoked at twenty-one of those dens of wickedness and death. I at first supposed that he would be so drunk that he could not navigate, but the more he drank, the harder he worked, and the more he swore both his English and Dutch. After going about two miles, I was called on for my fare. I told him I had paid, and my name was on the way bill. The driver was on called up, when he said he had no way bill; none had been furnished him; there was no alternative; I must pay again, though I do it very reluctantly. I state this fact that others may not thus be deceived. After changing horses, our difficulty increased; the horses proved to be very bulky, and our driver became drunken; the old omnibus broke down; we tied it up, and soon we were filled with a company of Dutchmen, who were as drunk as the driver. They could soon spend a half hour at one of those houses of infamy, while I sat alone in the stage. To remunerate, was useless; they must have their own time, and do as they please. At nine o'clock we arrived at our place of destination, and no convict was ever happier to get out of a prison, than I was to find myself among kind and sympathizing friends.

have been informed that this mail route was contracted to a government favorite, at an extravagant price, and the travelling community do not patronize it, only some of their own class, and strangers who are taken in.

This country is situated on the little Lehigh, being its southern branch. It is a very rich, fertile country; farms and very rich buildings are very large and costly. There are barns here that cost more than any dwelling house in Cumberland County. The house in which I am writing this, though a farm house, surpasses any that I am acquainted with in Bridgeton. The country is not only rich in agricultural productions, but in its mineral resources. Iron ore is found here in great abundance. Within a short distance from here, there are five steam engines at work; digging and washing iron ore. It is in small particles like gravel, mixed with dirt. They have a machine worked either by steam or horse power, by which they wash and separate it; it is then drawn by large mule teams to the furnaces, of which there are a number within a few miles of here. Men who are in the habit of digging for iron ore, and digging out the ore, are called "iron diggers," and they are very numerous.

they lease the privilege of digging, by paying a certain sum per ton for all the washed ore.

The inhabitants here are almost universally German, and use the German language; their religious services are all conducted in that language. The most of the men, and some of the women, can talk in English so as to be understood; but a sermon in English, is dry food to many of them. I have preached a number of times in different places, but many of them do not understand so as to be benefited; but the country is densely populated; large houses large barns, and large horses, but few meeting houses, when there is one, it belongs to the Lutherans, and the German Reformers, who use it alternately. This is not an evidence that the people are not religious; their large dwellings are houses of worship, and there they have frequent meetings. The different denominations of the age are here, and they worship God with an earnestness and zeal that may well put us, who are going on in our small like movements, to shame. They are remarkably fond of music, and they appear to be at no loss to have something to sing, and they all sing, both old and young, and truly it may be said of them, "they are all at it, and they are always at it."
