Fithian, John F. Keen, and Ercurius B. Fithian, Esquires, a committee to apply to the Legislature of New Jersey for an act appointing three mmissioners to locate the said public street: 1. BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and general Assembly of the State of New Jersey, that Belford M Bonham David Tomlin, and Ercurius B. Fithian, be, and they are hereby appointed com-missioners to ascertain the location of said street, and to lay out the same by courses and distances; but in case the said focation and courses and distances cannot be found, then relay out said street as follows: Beginning at Cohansey creek and laying the same to the late residence of Chas. Fithian, deceased, not lees than ninety feet in width: thence to John Tyler's house not less than eighty-five feet in width: thence to Samuel Mulford's stone house not less than eighty feet in width; thence t Pine Mount Run not less than

four rods in width, and there to end. 2.
