An act to authorize the sale of lands granted or An act to authorize the sale of lands granted or devised to religious societies in certain cases.

1. Be it enacted by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That whenever any incorporated religious society in this State entitled to lands and tenements granted or davised to them by dead will an otherwise and vey the same, shall represent to the chancellor of this State, that the interest of the person or the person or persons interested in the said lands and the said religious society as the case may be as far forth as relates to such lands, its proceeds and income shall be considered wards in chan-

cery.
