Mr. Richard D. Wood said to the citizens of Millville and vicinity, last fall, that if they would obtain a charter for a Railroad from Millville to Winslow, there to connect with the Camden and Atlantic Road, that he would subscribe for one haif the stock necessary to build it, and the President of that Company had made a written offer to lease the Road when built, and pay six p r cent. on its cost. The charter was obtained. A part of the citizens of Millville were favorable to the more direct route by way of Glassboro' and they also succeeded in getting a charter for a Road to that place. Now, here were two charters, and the question was, which Road must the effort be made to build. By the efforts and liberal subscriptions of the citizens of Glassboro' and Fisherville, the scale was turned in favor of that route, and against the in:erest of Mr. Wood This gentleman, however, with commendable liberality, now said that if a satisfactory arrangement could-be made with the West Jersey Company to extend their Road to connect with it, that he would do the same as he had promised—the Winslow Road, for the Glassboro' Road. 


