PUBLIC OPINION. All hail to public opinion! This is the ery that salutes us everywhere. Journalism eroushes before it; the Jurist and Divine ap. peal to it; in short, almost everybody confides in it, is satisfied with its approval, and fears its frown.

Let us for a moment so far forget our selves, as to examine the pretensions of this tyrant; of this jove with the momentous nod Truly enough, public opinion sometimes inculcates superior practices and principles, among other things. It on the whole denounces meanness of personal bearing, and general smallness of mind. It condemns unwarranted oppression and cruelty when practiced upon the weak. It lauds energy and perseverance, and here its list of prominent good qualities come to an end. "What!" cries the heated reader, "to say

no more, has it no honor for intellect or personal probity?" No, good reader, with sadness we are forced to say, that public opinion rarely discriminates, as it should, as to the quality of the intellect it reverences; neither does personal uprightness receive of it its just reward. Attend for a moment to examples. It counts any man worthy of admiration, on the score of talent, who will make a large sum of money in any way which is neither confessedly weak nor crimical. Is it not most true that the Quack and Charlatan, (we use these words, of course, in their most comprehensive sense) so that he but sucecceds in gaining unto himself a profusion of this world's goods, occupies almost, if not quite, as high a place in the general esteem, as the substantial, genuine master or craftsman? And further, as to the question of honesty of character. Who values that "noblest work of God"-a man of truth and integrity-as he should? The quality of the greater share of our public officers is a most sad, and at the same time the most unan. swerable reply to this question that can be brought forward. And to continue, public opinion is guilty of other, and grosser misdemeanors. Penniless Irish Peter or Patrick, guilty of murder or of any violence, of fraud, of breaking the Sabbath laws, or in a word, of any marked infraction of the legal code, shall most certainly suffer for his sins; while the millionaire, or a high honorable, may too often take human life, with scant justification, indulge in intemperance of any and all kinds, and be characterized by treachery, boorishness of manner, or any other blot on good conduct, and find the multitude at any and all times, ready to fall at his feet.

Also, public opinion insists upon it that in our free America, every man shall be as a slave. What is the common definition of a good citizen? Is it not that he is one who observes the moral law, and for the rest. works like a beaver both day and night?-Suppose that like a person desirous of enjoying a screne bodily condition, or indulging in a little human pastime, he was to divert bimself every afternoon with a harmless stroll, a game of ten pins, or a couple of hours shooting or fishing; how long would it be before he would be reproached with being a trifler, or something worse. We might continue in the specification of our charges. to a much greater length, but the brevity of our space forbids. We will merely say, relative to this part of the question, that notwithstanding this is the nineteenth century, and this country is the far vaunted American Republic, the aim of public opinion is by no means heavenward. The African slave. the ignorant, the criminal, and the working classes, both male and female, are all viewed by it in a far less favorable light than they should be, and engage its attention in a degree whose triviality is positively shameful. This leads us to put the inquiry, "What are the future hopes of the republic when the popular voice is admitted to be worldly, and the expositor of a base ideal?" Republicanism presupposes high aspirations on the part of citizens; a belief in all that is noble and refining, rather than a grovelling to that which is time serving and illiberal. Remember this. Let him then who really wishes well to his country, labor to alter this condition of things, and as a beginning in the good work, let him bend himself to rightmindedness. It were surely to be wished that a Dean Swift, of the hughest proportions of his don Brobding nag might arise among us, to make our absurdities so palpable to us, that we would cast them from us as matters too corrupt and noisome to be borne. But as yet (and the more sorrow for it) the man has not come, for the time has not come.

> SIR JOHN FRANKLIN. It is a satisfaction to be, at last, informed definitely of the fate of Sir John Franklin and the men composing his crews. The steamer Fox, Capt. McClintock, sent out by Lady Franklin, has got back to England with the full particulars, and many memorials of the ill-starred expedition. These were found on the northwest coast of King William's Island. A full record of the events that occurred in the expedition, dated April 25th, 1848, was found, and this shows 1847, up to which time nine officers and fifteen men had died. The survivors, 105 in number, were proceeding south to the Great Fish River. The discovery confirms the previous reports that have been receiv. ed. Dr. Rae ascertained from the Esquimaux, in 1854, that a party of about forty white men were on King William's Island in 1850, and a few months later they found their bodies not far from the Great Fish River. These were doubtless the last remnant of Franklin's party, who, after the close of the record lately discovered, started southward and gradually wasted away and perished.

The story of Franklin's expedition can now be told, from beginning to end, somewhat as follows . May 26th, 1845-The Erebus and Terror
