FRIDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

Hyot, of Boston, having appeared as counsel for Brown, and been admitted to the bar for that purpose, testimony for the State as to the proceedings at Harper's Ferry was continued, and the pros ecution rested. SATURDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

A number of witnesses were sworn for the defence, principally to show Brown's bumanity toward his prisoners, and his aver-

sion to shedding blood. Mr. Chilton then made application to have his client tried on only one of the four counts in the indictment, alleging that they were incongruous.

The Court said that the difference might perhaps be taken advantage of to move an arrest of judgment, but the jury had been charged and had been sworn to try the prisoners on the indictment as drawn. The defence closed their testimony a

about four o'clock, and the State desired to give the case to the jury without argument. Capt. Brown insisted that his counsel should argue the ease, and after the opening speech for the State, the Court adjourned to Monday morning, when the counsel for the prisoner would proceed.

The trial of Capt. Brown was concluded at Charleston, Va., on Monday, with a verdiet of guilty. Mr. Griswold made the opening speech for the defence. He claimed that Brown could not be guilty of treason, as he had never sworn allegiance to Virginia Neither did the evidence show that he had levied war against the State .-He admitted that the prisoner had come As to conspiracy to incite an insurrection, there was a difference between running off slaves and causing an uprising among them. He was followed by Mr. Hunter for the prosecution, who closed the argument, and Mr. Chilton asked the Court to justruct the jurythat if they believed Brown was not a citizen of Virginia, they could not convict him on account of treason. The Court declined, and Mr. C. asked that the jury should be instructed that they must be satisfied that the offence was committed within Jefferson

County. This was granted. A recess was taken for half an hour, when the jury came in with a verdict. There was intense excitement. Brown sat up in bed while the verdict was rendered.

The jury found him guilty of treason, advising and conspiring with slaves and others to rebel, and for murder in the first degree. Brown laid down quickly, and said nothing. There was no demonstration of any kind .-Mr. Chilton moved an arrest of judgment, both on account of error in the indictment and error in the verdief. The objection in regard to the indictment has already been stated. The prisoner has been tried for an offence not appearing on the record of the grand jury. The verdict was not on each count separately, but was a general verdict on the whole indictment.

The following remarks on the conviction of Brown, are from the Philadelphia Eve-

"Justice moves rapidly in an excited community—so rapidly that it almost forfeits its title and becomes injustice. The Virginians have not recovered from the fright they were thrown into by the fanatic John Brown, before they try him and convict him of a triple erime-treason, conspiracy, and murder.-Probably before a week clapses he will be executed. There is still a lingering terror throughout Northern Virginia, and it can

only be allayed by Brown's blood. The trial of this man will be criticised by lawyers, and it will not bear severe criticism. For there were defects in the indictment there was indecent haste in the proceedings, and there are incongruities in the verdict .-But a formal and technically correct procesding is a matter of no moment in a case like this and in the midst of popular excitement. been any probability of his acquittal, he would probably have been taken by a mob from the hands of justice, tried by a Lynch court, and hung up summarily to the nearest tree. There are Virginians who, even as it is, rather regret having forborne to proceed in this manner.

That Brown, with a good deal of intelligence on most subjects, is instant on this date of abolition, we cannot doubt. The loss of his sons, who were victims of the pri-slavery ruffians in Kansas, brought on his mo io na nia. His whole scheme of ravolution, his provisional government plan, and his att impt to accomplish his purposes with only about twenty men, show a disordered intellect .-But sane or insure, we agree with the Vir ginians that he is a dangerous min, and it is unsafe to suffer him to be at liberty. might concoct new mischief an ! bring on far bloodier scenes than those of Harper's Ferry. The sufferings and the trial that he has gone mong the weak minded and fanticil. Vic ginia has a right to employ extreme measures to get rid of such a man and put him forever out of the power of again subverting

her laws and disturbing her peace. But it is questionable whether imprismment for life would not be a wiser as well as a more merciful condemnation than execution. The grand object of putting a mis chievous man out of the way would be accomplished, without the cruelty of killing one who is scarcely accountable for what he has done as an abolitionist. If he is hung, he is exalted to martyrdom, and his name, his fate and his memory will be watchwords to excite to new and far more serious risings than for which he suffered. For the particular crimes for which he has been convicted the only sentence is death. But we trust it is in the power and will be in the disposition of the Executive of Virginia to commute the punishment to imprisonment

Apropos of this, a Pittsburgh paper refers to the "Whiskey Insurrection" in this State, seventy five years ago, where there was a far more formidable attempt to outrage the government. A number of the insurgents were arrested and two were couvicted of treason and sentenced to death; but both were pardoned by President Wash. ington, and there has never been an attempt at insurrection since then in Pennsylvania. The supremaca of the government and the peace of the country were mantained with out bloodshed and without loss of a particle of dignity. It is not asked that Gov. Wise should stretch his magnanimity so far as to give Brown a free pardon, as Washington did to the whiskey insurgents. But he is asked, as a measure of wisdom and of mercy, to spare his life and consign him to prison. He is old, feeble and funatical. and in the common course of nature, he will end his life before many years. trust that an effort will be made to have him saved from the scaffold."
