Proper Fattening of Fowls. We make the following extracts from an article on this subject in the London Cot-

tage Gardener, and commend them to our "It is hopeless to attempt to fatten them while they are at liberty. They must be put in r proper coop.; and this, like most other poultry appurtenances, need not be expensive. To fatten twelve fowls, a coop may be three feet long, eighteen inches high, and eighteen inches deep, made entire-ly of bars; no part of it solid—neither top,

sides, nor bottom. Discretion must be used according to the sizes of the chickens put up. They do not want room; indeed, the closer they are, the better-provided, they can all stand up at the same time. must be taken to put up such as have been accustomed to be together, or they will ples, it soon finds imitators. A diseased chicken should not be put up.

"The food should be ground oats; and latter is better. It should be well-slaked. forming a pulp as loose as can be, provided it does not run off the board. They must be well fed, three or four times per day -the first time us soon after day-break as may be as much as, and no more than they can eat up clean. When they have done feeding, the board should be wiped, and some grave may be spread. It causes them to feed and thrive.

"After a fortnight of this treatment, you will have good fat fowls. If, however, there are but four or six to be fatted, they must ers, and does yer honor suppose that I was not have as much room as though there were trundled all the way over the salt ocean in a twelve. Nothing is easier than to allot them the proper space; as it is only necessary to have two or three pieces of wood to pass between the bars, and form a partition. This may also serve when fowls are up at different degrees of fatness. This requires attention, or fowls will not keep fat and healthy. As soon as the fowl is sufficiently fatted, it must be killed; otherwise it will still get fat, but it will lose flesh. If fowls are intended for the market, of course they are, or may be, all fatted at once; but if for home consumption, it is better to put them up at such intervals as will suit the time when they will be required for table When the time arrives for killing, whether they are meant for market or otherwise, they should be fasted, without food or water, for twelve or fifteen hours. This enables them to be kept for some time after being killed, even in hot

An Army of Hogs.

An exchange says that one million, three hundred and ten thousand bogs were slaughtered at the different establishments in Louisville, during the year ending Sept. 1st .-But few persons can realize how immense a number a million is. In national transactions, we become accustomed to hearing the terms, millions of acres, and millions of dollars used so much, as to make the term familiar to us, with scarce a conception of the amount implied. To count a million of dollars singly, at the rate of ninety a minute. nearly two-thirds of a month's steady labor. the hogs slaughtered in one year at Louis- by a majority of 162. ville. The grain required to fat this number of hogs, would form no inconsiderable item of production. If they eat but a quart a day, it would require more than forty thousand bushels for their daily tood, besides the rivers of swill necessary to wash it down.

Unless we make occasional computations of this kind, we can form but a very imperfeet idea of the business or resources of the country. What has been given above, is but a single item of the business of one city in the Union, transacted mainly in three or four of the winter and fall months.


