While it is deplorably true that there is too much of an inclination in many parts of the country to engage in games of chance, for the purpose of acquiring sudden wealth, er of merely passing away idle time, it is sedoubtedly equally true, that diversions for strengthening the physical, and through them the intellectual powers, are not encouraged and sustained as they ought to be .--The idea that it is unmanly for those above twenty years of age to engage in active plays, simply because they have played them when boys, is absurd. Our physical aud intellectual natures are so closely combined, that one cannot long remain diseased, without affecting the other. It is often said that a diseased body cannot shold a sound mind. Although this may not be true in all cases, it is probably true in general.-In all our towns and cities, and in most villages, much the larger population are employed in sedentery or in-door pursuits.-Hence, we meet at every corner the pallid face, the languid step, the leaden eye, all unmistakeable evidences of physical debility and languor. Besides the evils to the system, resulting necessarily from such employments, we, as a people, are so addicted to the use of liquor, tobacco, coffee, to gormandising, and other nerve-destroying practices, that the wonder really is, that our nervous system is not completely prostrated sooner than it is. Public attention is, however, beginning to be turned to the subject, and games of ball, principally of cricket, are becoming popular. We hail this as a sign of both moral and physical improvement. There is, in the practice of these plays, room for the exercise and development of the moral and social qualities. The skill and judgment required to perform sucecasfully each required part, the necessary subordination to the laws of the game, and the duty of each, not only to play fair him-

Execution of Copeland, Green Cook and Coppee.

Charleston, Va., on Friday of last week. About eight o'clock on Thursday even ing, the whole town was thrown into commotion, when the alarm was given of The Attempted Escape.

At quarter past eight o'clock last even ing, the whole town was thrown into comnotion by the report of a rifle under the jail wall, followed by several other shots from the vicinity of the guard house, in close proximity to the jail. The military were called to arms, and

the excitement was intense—beyond anything that has yet occurred during our ever memorable era of military occupation.

In a few minutes the streets and avenue of the town were in possession of armed men, and it was with some difficulty that the cause of all this turmoil could be ascer-

Rumors of every description were affoat, and it was at one time thought that the prisoners had overpowered their guards and made their escape, and then that an attack had been made on the jail by parties attempting to rescue the prisoners.

The sentinel stationed near the iail ported, that a quarter past eight o'clock, he observed a man on the jail wall, whom he challenged, and receiving no answer, fired at him. The head of another man was also seen above the wall, this he retreated as soon as the first one had been fired at. The man on the top of the wall seemed at first determined to persist, and was about making an attempt to jump down when the sentinel declared his intention of both gave themselves up without further resistance. They placed these against the wall, and soon succeeded in reaching the top, from which they could have easily dropped to the other side, had not the vigitance of the sentinel on duty so quickly checked their movements.

They were arrested in the jail yard Gen. Taliaferro, and an officer of the day, who rushed to the juil the moment the alarm was given. Gen. Taliaferro immediately tolegraphed to Gov. Wise, informing him of the frustrated attempt of the prisoners. His answer directed that the military should immediately take possession of the interior of the jail, and guard the prisoners until they were executed.

Sheriff Campbell and Captain Avis are of course, much chagrined at this narrow escape of their prisoners, especially as they had resisted all interference of the military with the interior discipline of the juil. The prisoners were shrewd and cunning fellows, and they were, undonbtedly, withcont any accomplices in their undertaking. Their friends, who were still here, were also fearful that they might be suspected of

baving knowledge of the attempt. The general impression is, that if the prisoners had waited until midnight, or luter, they might have reached the mountains. But it is presumed they were fearful of being watched during the night, or desired to have as much of darkness as possible to gain a good distance before daylight would allow of a general pursuit.

Execution of Copeland and Green At half past 10 o'clock, Gen. Talisferro, with his staff, numbering about twenty five officers, having given orders to propare the two negro prisoners, Shiells Green and John Copeland, for execution, took their departure to join the main body of troops on the field. The military thou formed a hollow square around the jail, and an open wagon, containing the coffins of the prisoners, drew up in front, with a carriage to convey Sheriff Campbell and his deputies. The crowd of citizens and strangers was very great—at least five times as numerous as on the occasion of Brown's executionmost of whom were already on the field, whilst others waited = to see the prisoners brought out.

The religious ceremonies in the cell were very impressive, and were conducted by the Rev. Mr. North, of the Presbyterian. an the Rev. Mr. Beverly Waugh, of the M E. church. At a quarter before 1 o'clock, the prisoners, accompanied by Sheriff Campbell and the Rev. Mr. North, appeared at marched slowly forward toward the vehicle in waiting for them. They seemed downcast, and wore some of that Calu, fearless wagon, and took seats on the comm, wiveous scarcely looking to the right or left. The escort now commenced to move, the wagon being closely flanked on either side by a company of riflemen, marching in double

At seven minutes before 11 o'clock, the procession entered the field ordupied by the military, and the prisoners cast a shuddering glance toward the gallows erected on the rising ground in ils centre. In two minutes more the wagon stopped at the foot of the gallows, whilst the prisoners were alighting, the companies forming the escort moved off to the position assigned them on The four prisoners were executed at the field.

The prisoners mounted the scuffold with firm step, and were immediately joined by Sheriff Campbell, After a brief prayer by one of the clergymen, the caps were pul led over their heads, and the ropes adjusted around their necks. During the few minutes they thus stood, Copeland remained quiet, but Green was engaged in earnest prayer, up to the moment the trap was drawn, and they were launched into eternity. Green died very easy, his neck being broken by the falk and the motion of his oody was very slight. Copeland seemed to suffer very much, and his body writhed in violent contortions for several minutes: -They were accompanied on the scaffeld by the Rev. Messrs. Waugh, North and Lahr, to whom they bid an affectionate farewell. and expressed the hope of meeting them in

heaven. The bodies, after being cut down, were R placed in poplar coffins, and carried back to 0 he iail. They will be interred to-morrow on the spot where the gallows stand, though here is a party of medical students here from Winchester, who will doubtless not allow them to remain there long.

Execution of Cook and Coppec.
