Made at the Conservative Meeting, held in the Theatre, in the city of Newark, on Friday evening, Dec. 28, 1859. FELLOW CITIERES OF NEWARK-This onthusi-

natic welcome you have just given me, is exceedingly gratifying, coming from such an immense assemblage—composed not of men bound together by party ties, connected by the marrow dis-tinction of some party shibboleth; but of men

I am, citizens, no alarmist, nor do I think I can be said to belong to that nervous class, who take counsel of their fears on all occasions, giving ever to light clouds floating above their heads, the blackness of darkness that belongs to the storm cloud, and hearing the mutterings a tempest, in every breeze that fans the cheek,

or lifts the hair. But he must be of singular obtuseness, Resolved, That we call a Convention of can view with calmness the alarming presages Ministers and Laymen within the New Jer- and portents that seem to threaten us. It is a time of apprehension, a time of gloom, a time when the warning words of the Father of his Country should fall upon the national ear startling significance and earnestness-"You cannot, my countrymen, shield yourselves too much against the jealousies and heartburnings that spring from misrepresentations, tending to render alien to each other those who ought to be bound together by the ties of fraternal affection.

Oh! my Fellow Countrymen, what a rich leg-acy our great Nation's Father has left us in that Farewell Address, from which I have just quoed. It embodies the wisdom of the sage, with the foreknowledge of the prophet. It the ardent fervor of the patriot, with that devo-ted love which earned for him above all others in the world's history, the well deserving title of "Father of his Country." 
