The Hoboken Land and improvement Company is the sole applicant for the road; and no other individual or company, except myself, is con-cerned in it, directly or indirectly, except the interest which the public have in the establishment of another road. The application is no monopoly scheme, nor part of any monopoly scheme; neither the Camden and Amboy Company, (which seems from other parts of the address to be particularly pointed at,) nor any of dress to be particularly pointed at,) not and to judge.

The principal authority given in the first section; and that to ment Company, I shortly afterwards contracted, which all the other powers are expressly subser- at large expense; for a right of way for a road which all the other powers are expressly subservient, is to lay out, construct, and operate a railroad from Hoboken to Newark. No man can understand this to be an authority to take and appropriate a railroad already in existence. No absurd. And no such object was ever entertained by the applicants for the bill. It is true, power is given to take, use, and exercise such property franchises, and bridges as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing the proposed road-but only as a means to that end; and only upon making full compensation for the property or franchises thus to be taken or used. This can not be construed as relating to the road-bed or bridges of another railroad company; without express words to that effect. The pow er given is not an unusual one. In this case it is eminently proper, because the Newark Bridge Company, claims the exclusive right to creet bridges between Newark and Hoboken; and in granting a power to make a railroad on that route, their claims whether valid or otherwise. can not be ignored. An amendment to the bill was introduced in the Senate, providing, in effect, that no part of the road or bridges of the New Jersey Railroad Company should be exclusively appropriated under the act-seeming to mply that they might be partially appropriated This amendment was made to satisfy those who desired more fully to protect the New Jersey Railroad Company, and not by my suggestion or desire. The leading feature of the bill, and that which gives force and construction to all the rest is the power which it gives to lay out and construct a railroad between Hoboken and Newark; and that power, by necessary implication, contemplates a new railroad and not an old one .-The rest of the bill consists of the details requisite for carrying out the principal idea.

Is it true, then, that power is asked, to swal low up the New Jersey Railroad and bridges?— Even if the hill, as amended in the Senate should inferentially authorize the use of the New Jersey Railroad: Company's bridges in commo with that Company, the assertion made by the Committee is untrue. Therefore all the inferences made by the Committee from their hypothesis-such as the power of the Hoboken Company to cut the New Jersey Railroad in two, take away its bridges, etc , fall to the ground. 3. If the New Jersey Company desire to disturb the harmonions relations existing between the two Companies, it lies with themselves to do so. I have no such object in view. The Hoboken Company's application has nothing to do with that subject, and has no connection with it whatever, and the New Jersey Company cannot intimidate me from seeking establish a railroad between Hoboken and Newark, he any threats they may make against the Camden and Amboy Company, or the securi-

The Committee manifest great anxiety lest the Hoboken Company, after obtaining authority to construct the proposed road, might sell out to the New Jersey Company, and thus defraud the public out of the anticipated benefits of the road. The attitude of the Committee is certainly a singular one. They disclaim all interest in the matter themselves! Their sole fear is for the public! But I pass this, and will advert to some mis-statements of fact, made by them in this It is asserted to be the old policy of the ownof Hoboken to hire out his grants, and to ignore the interest of the public in them; and that he has realized near \$800,000 out of the nublic through the New Jersey Railroad Compa-

ny by his clause in their quarter. This is a false and unfair statement of the facts referred to. Those facts are as follows: When the charter of the New Jersey Railroad Company was obtained, the Hoboken Ferry had the majority of the travel from Newark. Great pains had been taken, and great expense incurred, to make it the safest, best, and most convenient ferry on the river. The railroad, if located to Jersey City, would deprive the proprietors of this ferry of its business. As Agent for the Hoboken Land and Improvefrom the Hoboken ferry through the Bergen Tun-nel to the New Jersey Railroad; and on the seventeenth of December last, addressed the New Jersey Company a note, calling their attention court would so construct it; to do so would be to the rights of the Hoboken Company to a branch road under their Charter; stating the fact of having procured the right of way for such branch at a large expense; and desiring to know whether such an arrangement for its operation could be made with them, as would give the Hoboken ferry equal facilities of communication with Newark to those enjoyed by the Jersey City ferry; and on what terms they would operate the said branch road with one half of their trains, or permit the Hoboken Company, or its lessees, to run trains on the New Jersey road from the branch to Newark. On the twenty-seventh of December the N. J. Company sent me an answer, recognizing the right of the Hoboken Comwillingness to afford said Company every right-and privilege provided by the Charter of the N. J. Company, to enable the ferry of the Hoboken Company to enjoy equal facilities of commu-adeation with Newark; but, referring for the rates of tolls to the eighth section of their Charter-that is, three cents per mile per passenger-to be paid by the Hobokon Company for the use of the N. J. road alone; and, if my memory serves me, an additional charge for locomoive and cars. This was of course, impossible. The New Jersey Company do not charge their own passengers three cents per mile, at their present highest rates; and if they should charge the Hoboken Company that amount, without any additional charge, it is evident that the latter Company must run their cars for nothing, and

pay a premium besides. The answer, of course, was a mere mockery, and was so intended Subsequently, Mr. Bliss, the President of the Hoboken Company, and myself, with Mr. Ship pen, had an interview with a Committee of the N. J. Company, at which propositions were made on both sides. The New Jersey Committee subing terms to wit:

Esssex Branch to Newark-and to pay thirty named branch, besides keeping it in repair; and in addition thereto, eight cents per passenger up to three hundred thousand passengers, and cents for all above that-and the force from Newark to New York to be uniform with those of the New Jersey Company. By this offer, if the Hoboken cars should carry three hundred thousand passengers in a year, they would have to pay therefore, to the New Jersey Company, in the first place, thirty thousand dollars for the use of the Morris and Essex branch and bridge, (besides repairing the same;) then eight cen's each for three hundred thousand passengers, which would be twenty-four thousand dollars more, making a total of fifty four thousand dollars. This, for the three hundred thousand passengers would be eighteen cents apiece, beside the before mentioned repairs, which would probably increase it to nineteen cents. Now, the average of the present fares from Newark to New York was stated by Mr. Jackson to be twenty cents. In the absence, then, of any reduction of present fares, the Hoboken Company would get the amount of one cent per passenger as their share of the proceeds—they finding four miles of the route, including their ferry, and all the machinery and rolling stock, and running their cars and boats nine miles, and paying all

incidental expenses.

Such was the liberal manner in which the New Jersey Company proposed to give the Hoboken Ferry Equal facilities of communication with Newark, to those possessed by the Jersey City Ferry ! Of course this offer could not be accepted, and was not intended to be when

made. I then made them three different offers on behalf of the Hoboken Company, basel on the Hoboken Company's building the Hoboken branch, which with the ferry would be four miles in length, the New Jersey road and ferry being nine miles, and the connection, of the two being at the Hackensack river, five miles from Newark. The propositions were optional with them and were these:

1st. That the Hoboken Company should run their own trains from Hoboken to Newark, and after deducting 40 per cent. for expenses, should give the New Jersey Company five ninths of the the net proceeds of that business. This would be a division of profits according to the length out allowing any profits on the capital invested in machinery and rolling stock. Or-2. That the net proceeds of both lines to Newark, (each party being allowed 40 per cent. on the business done by them,) should be divided between the parties in proportion to the length of each party's road, including ferry: that is, nine thirteenths to the New Jersey Company, and four thirteenths to the Hoboken Company.

3d. That the New Jersey Company should opcrate both roads, and after deducting 40 per cent for doing the work, divide the net proceeds as before, that is, nine thirteenths to the New Jersey Company, and four thirteenths to the Hoboken Company. All these propositions were based on the sup-

position, that each party should keep its own portion of the road and ferry in repair. In making these propositions my object was to secure, on the part of the Hoboken Company, as owners of the ferry, the fair rights to which they were entitled under the spirit of the New Jersey Company's Charter.

Now turn to the Statement of the Committee as above quoted—in which no notice is taken of the obligation of the Hoboken Company unde keep it in repair, and to furnish and run ferryboats at Hoboken; and the proposed share of a "subsidy." Is it a fair, a true, or an honora ble statement of this transaction? Does it represent me in a fair light? I should not have been surprised at Mr. Jackson's making such a statement; but I confess I was surprised that the other gentlemen on that committee should

The suggestions of the Committee, therefore as to the probable course which the Houcken Company will pursue, by referring to their former arrangement, made by them with the New Jersey Company, are gratuitous and Jesuitical, and evidently intended to produce a false impres sion. They leave out of view the different cir-

cumstances of the two cases.

I make no further comments on this manifesto of the New Jersey Railroad Company. I think I have sufficiently shown its falsity and unfairness. I leave the public to judge between them-
