JERSEY PATRIOTS THROWING TEA OVER-BOARD.—Richard S. Coxe, Esq., of Washington, D. C., in a letter to R. H. Gillet, 81st, 1860, states that in the year 1817, he was informed by Gen. Giles, an omeer of the army of the Revolution, a resident of Bridgeton, Cumberland county, N. J., that in the year 1773-4, some vessels which were laden with tea and bound to Philadelphia, Approved March 21, 1860. apprehending some difficulty in landing their cargoes there, proceeded to Cohansey creek, which enters Dehware Bay through Cumberland co., N. J. While at anchor in the creek, some gentlemen of the neighborhood, in broad daylight and undisguised, boarded the vessels and threw the whole of the tea overboard.

Assembly of the State of New Jersey, That it shall be lawful for any express company, chartunclaimed freight, articles or goods not perishable, which may have been in their possession for six months or over, and when the owner or owners, consignee or consignees, are unknown, cannot be found, or refuse to receive such freight, articles or goods; and may in like manner sell all articles of a perishable nature in five days if such articles would depreciate in value by being longer kept; provided, that-before such sale shall be made, public notice shall be given by six insertions in the newspapers; and by notices set up in at least three of the most public places in the neighborhood at which such freight, articles or goods were directed to be left, and where the sale is to take place, naming the articles to be sold, the name of the person to whom directed, if known, and the time and place of sale, at least five days before the time of sale; and in case of perishable articles, such notice shall be , if known, and the time and place of sale, at sufficient, if so set up at least three full days, and also advertisement inserted in a newspaper

provided in the foregoing section shall be made o'clock in the forenoon and four o'clock in the afternoon, and if the residence of the person to whom the article is directed be known, the company shall serve a copy of the notice of sale on such person before the sale, and it shall be the duty of every express company making a sale as aforesaid, to keep a book in which shall be recorded a list of all articles sold by them, the


